Languages





This year, 33 students from Years 9 to 12 in Languages classes took part in the Australian Computational Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO) competition. This competition challenges students to develop their own strategies for solving problems in fascinating ancient and real languages. In 2021, students had to decode very challenging languages once again. Everyone worked extremely hard to complete the tasks for two hours! Many students said, "My brain hurts, but it was fun!". Another student said "I was surprised that I could actually understand languages like Beja (Sudanese language) which I have never learnt. I think because I've been learning a second language at school." The number of students taking part in this competition has been increasing every year and we look forward to more students joining in 2022.

Here are some comments from students.

During Week 5, Language students in Years 9 - 12 had the opportunity to take part in the OzCLO language competition. We were grouped in teams of four and were asked to develop strategies to solve different language challenges. The challenges were not in Japanese, French or German but rather old and new languages including West Afrikaans, Irish and Indigenous. This was designed to challenge our mental

capacity to adapt to new challenges and use our combined knowledge of the languages taught at Daramalan College to understand and solve problems in new languages. Overall, it was a very fun, intriguing, and engaging afternoon and was a very good learning experience.

The OzClo was a brand-new experience for me. It was fascinating to explore all the different languages - some of which had only a few thousand native speakers. The competition was like solving a puzzle, one whose conventions and vocabulary were completely different to many of the English conventions that we usually take for granted. The Medieval Irish Ogham alphabet, an early form of

Gaelic, challenged us to decipher difficult clues and with newfound knowledge, produce our own sentences in an unfamiliar script. Most importantly, it was a lot of fun for everyone involved, and I am looking forward to participating again next year.

Kosciuszko National Park

Year 8 Geography field trip to Kosciuszko National Park

On Monday 1 March and Wednesday 3 March, Year 8 Geography classes travelled to Kosciuszko National Park to examine Australia's unique alpine environment. We stopped at three different locations to explore the montane, sub-alpine and alpine ecosystems and gather data about the changing flora, fauna, and weather conditions. Students used a range of geographical field tools including species identification keys, clinometers, handheld weather meters and quadrats to gather their data and heard from National Park rangers about the importance of preserving the area for future use.

International Women's Day 2021

Information Centre

International Women's Day 2021's theme of #ChooseToChallenge is a call to create a more inclusive society by challenging outdated ideologies. This theme suggests that we as individuals can quietly watch gender bias, discrimination and equality occur around us, or we can call it out. Our role in the Information Centre and as Teacher Librarians is to identify gender bias in literature.

Literature is a reflection of society because the storylines, characterisations and language of the time are captured by the author (Zanfabro, 2015). This is why Austen's Elizabeth Bennett, Bronte's Jane Eyre, Mitchell's Scarlett O'Hara, Collins' Katniss Evergreen, and Dahl's Matilda Wormwood are so memorable. They were the rebels of their time and as such, inspired other women to challenge prevailing standards and rebel against societal expectations of femininity. Literature has a great capacity to inspire, provoke and challenge the reader, but the presence of strong female protagonists is not the norm. A recent study of books published indicates that less than 30% of fiction texts have a strong female character (Green, 2018). The primary theory for this disparity is that males don't like reading books with female protagonists, whereas females are less discriminatory about their reading material. Therefore, it is safer for publishers to print books that feature male protagonists as they have a wider appeal (Rebel Girls, 2017).

Gender bias in literature and publishing has ramifications. Strong female characters are excellent role models for both sexes (Green, 2018). Female protagonists in fiction texts normalise physically and cognitively strong women, they point out that it is ok for females to have a leadership role and mostly, that strong women do not mean boys are weak (Green, 2018). Interestingly whilst strong female protagonists are found in varying forms of literature in many differing capacities, they are rarely captured as leaders, unless based upon a historical figure or a biography (Green, 2018).

In the afternoon, students attended a skills session to learn how to develop a two-minute pitch. The groups were then given time to identify an issue at their school, formulate a proposal for change and fashion it into a short and sharp pitch. The final part of the day involved all groups presenting their ideas using the two-minute pitch format. Our Principal, Rachel Davies, came to listen to the group pitch their proposal. The students had a wonderful day discussing how they could make change in their own context. Not only were the students inspired by the speakers, but they also learned practical skills to bring inspiration closer to reality.



Learner and Provisional Drivers

In January 2020, the process for Learner and Provisional Drivers in the ACT changed.

Learner and Provisional drivers are categorised as a Vulnerable Road User group, so the new processes have been put in place to support young drivers learning to drive and gain experience on the road through better driver education.

For Learner Drivers:

- There are two new courses for ACT Car Learner Drivers: The Safer Driver Course and the Vulnerable Road User Program. These courses provide additional knowledge and skills to Learner drivers. These courses provide a Learner driver with hours towards the required driving hours needed to obtain an ACT Provisional Car Licence. These courses are not compulsory to obtain a provisional car licence.
- Required driving hours for learners have increased:
 - If you are under 25 when you are issued with your learner licence you must undertake a minimum of 100 supervised driving hours, including a minimum of 10 hours at night-time.





FOR OUR NEW DRIVERS

- Introduction of a mandatory Hazard Perception Test before getting their Provisional Licence.
- Reduced demerit point threshold for learner drivers from 12 points to four points.

For Provisional Drivers significant changes have been made to better support and ensure P-platers are safe on our roads. These changes include:

- Introduction of a two staged Provisional Licence:
 - A red P plate for the first 12 months (P1) with late night peer passenger restrictions.
 - A green P plate for the remaining two years (P2).
 If you are 25 or older when you are issued with your provisional licence, you will be a P2 for the entire three-year provisional licence period.
- Α provisional driver will no longer be demerit threshold to increase their point displaying P-Plates. be from or exempt

Pre-Learner drivers will still have to be at least 15 years and 9 months of age, and have successfully completed the mandatory Pre-Learner Licence training course (currently Road Ready) and Road Rules Knowledge Test. This Pre-Learner Licence training course will still be offered to the students through the school at a reduced rate compared to the cost incurred via external providers. It is not necessary for a Pre-Learner Driver to complete it through the school, but it must be completed in some form before they can complete the Road Rules Knowledge Test and receive their Learner Licence.

At this stage, students will need to obtain a copy of their academic transcript from the BSSS Profiles Online and upload their Year 11 results directly into the ANU application portal. Please note, those who intend on applying for the Tuckwell Scholarship should be aware of the different application deadline.




