From the Principal



**Dear Parents/
Carers, Staff and
Students,**

It has been wonderful to have all of our students back onsite this week for face-to-face learning. This week is the first time since 11 August that we have had our entire community together. Having all year groups onsite has not been without its logistical challenges. Key Health directives in place for the return to school this year include the need to minimise the amount of time that students from different year groups are mixing at break times and also the mandatory wearing of masks indoors. I would like to thank our students who have followed the Covid-safety measures that we have in place. Our priority is maintaining the health and

safety of our community, and with this, ensuring that we minimise the likelihood of returning to online learning due to the College needing to close due to the identification of a positive case.

As we return to face-to-face learning, can I reiterate that should your student be unwell and experiencing cold and flu symptoms, they should not be attending onsite, face-to-face, learning. From the Principal

The current Health Directives have meant that many of our usual Term 4 events are not able to go ahead in the format that we had originally proposed or at all. The directives for schools, including functions, are very different to those for the general ACT public in relation to density requirements and the number of adults who can be in attendance both onsite here at the College and at external venues. I would like to thank our families for their understanding in relation to what we can and cannot have in place under these guidelines. As I have mentioned previously in my Covid Updates, this year the directives the College must follow come from ACT Health, rather than guidance from the Education Directorate.

Year 12 2021

Last Wednesday 27 October, the College held its final whole school assembly for the year, be it virtually through a live streamed event. This assembly provided the broader community the opportunity to farewell and acknowledge our Year 12 students. As I mentioned at this assembly, we have been privileged to have had such impressive student leaders guiding the student body through such a disruptive and uncertain year. No matter what has been thrown at our College and Portfolio Captains, **Patrick, Maya, Sophie, Lisa, Asha, Isabella** and **Andrew**, they have risen to the challenge, adapted and inspired new initiatives, both here onsite at the College or virtually when we have all been at home in lockdown.

Our Year 12 students begin their exams today. We all wish them well as they move towards a new and exciting point in their lives. I would like to state how impressed I have been with the way they have managed the range of disappointments they have experienced over the past two years due to the Covid-19 lockdowns and restrictions.

The past few months of 2021 have not been an easy time for most of us, but the students have remained positive and

understanding about the changes that have had to be made and I thank them for this. They have shown themselves to be very resilient and optimistic – excellent attributes which will stand them in good stead for the future. Thank you and congratulations Year 12, 2021.

Chevalier Day

Like so many of our other major events this year, our Chevalier Day Liturgy was celebrated in an online format. It was lovely, however, to be able to share a community lunch with the Year 11 and 12 students in their respective courtyard areas. I hope that our Year 7-10 students were able to make the most of their reset and refresh day and were able to nurture their hearts in the spirit of Jules Chevalier.

Missions fundraising

October and November are traditionally the months where we raise money for MSC Missions, particularly through events on Chevalier Day and Melbourne Cup Day. The College has run some alternatives, including an online escape room that raised \$500. Congratulations to our Social Justice and Mission Captains, **Sophie** and **Lisa**, and the Social Justice Group for coming up with this unique fundraising opportunity. This year we are directing the funds to a very special project the purchase of PPE (in particular, masks and gloves) for Catholic Church Health Services who run health clinics in Papua New Guinea. Through **Fr Roger Purcell MSC**, the head of MSC Missions we are aiming to get funds to **Sr Geraldine Arua OLSH**, Health Secretary of the Diocese of Port Moresby, to pay for badly needed PPE equipment. As you may be aware Papua New Guinea is struggling under the pressure of Covid-19 cases at the moment and currently only has 1.2% of its population fully vaccinated. Fr Roger has been liaising with Sr Geraldine and the equipment they need can be purchased in PNG for just under \$1,000. If you would like to assist with this specific MSC Missions Project, donations can be made via the QKR App.



Fashion and Textiles display

Many of our usual events have not been able to take place this year due to the lockdown restrictions, including the annual deGAFF exhibition. It has been wonderful to be able to view the final projects of the Year 11 and 12 Fashion and Textiles students over the past week which have been displayed in the College entrance area and the Staff Irwin Lounge. 

Daramalan Triumphs at the 2021 SEAACT Science Fair

This year students achieved 7 Gold CREST and 7 Silver CREST awards (see the October Daranews for details and the photo below). All were entered in the ACT Science Fair, along with 4 other projects:

Thomas Neighbour (Year 7) - The effect of temperature on the reaction time and brightness of glowsticks

Jack Smith (Year 10) - The effect of tyre pressure on the speed of a mountain bike rolling downhill

Esmari Swanepoel (Year 10) - The effect of different piano notes on C2 sympathetic vibration

Duncan Nutt and **Sam Worsnop** (Year 12) - Tornado simulator

All 18 entries received an award (1st, 2nd, Highly Commended or Encouragement) and cash prize (in fact an old-fashioned cheque: \$250 for 1st to \$50 for an Encouragement award). These awards were announced this week in an online ceremony at <https://seaact.act.edu.au/science-fair/>. Following is a list of the students and their awards.

The entry system into the National BHP Foundation Science and Engineering Awards has changed with the Covid-19 pandemic and each state/territory can only enter their best five students and their projects. The 40 projects entered will then be judged and 20 finalists and 20 semi-finalists chosen. From the 20 finalists - 1st, 2nd and 3rd in Engineering and Investigations will then be chosen, based on the report, a poster and a 5-minute presentation.

In a remarkable result, 4 of the 5 entrants from ACT are from Daramalan: **Abbey Curran**, **Ella Harries**, **Kenneth Le** and **Thomas Konarski** (all Gold CREST students). Abbey, Ella and Kenneth had ANU-based investigations while Thomas designed a solely solar powered quadcopter and was mentored by **Ryan Locke**, now in his 4th Year Aeronautical Engineering at UNSW ADFA.

To top it all off, Daramalan College has won the ACT Science Fair Secondary Schools shield as the school with the highest quality and most numerous award winners. Daramalan won the shield in 2017-19, lost it to Lyneham High School in 2020, and we have won it back!



Unique Student Identifier (USI)

The Australian Government requires all students undertaking Vocational Education & Training (VET) courses, to have a Unique Student Identifier (USI). This ten number and letter identifier will allow students to access their VET training records and results as a transcript from their online USI account. This transcript will be useful when applying for a job or undertaking further study.

It is important that all VET students apply for a USI. If a student does not apply for a USI and register this with Daramalan College, we will not be able to certify this student with any of the vocational competencies they may have achieved.

What will happen to my USI?

Firstly, Ms Waddleton will verify the USI as being correct, and the Daramalan College Registrar will enter the USI into our student management system. It will also be accessible by the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies who issue Vocational Certificates and Statements of Attainment for all ACT Colleges, and report to the Australian Government on vocational outcomes.

How do students apply for a USI?

1. Have at least one form of ID ready

- Birth Certificate (Australian)
- Driver's Licence
- Medicare Card
- Australian Passport
- Visa (with Non-Australian Passport) for international students
- Certificate of Registration by Descent
- Citizenship Certificate
- ImmiCard

2. Go to the USI website (www.usi.gov.au) and follow the steps under Student-Get a USI.

When your USI has been created it will appear on the screen. Beneath this there is box whereby you can type my email jane.waddleton@daramalan.act.edu.au and a copy will be emailed to me directly. If you send it to me yourself, please include your Year group and your Date of Birth.

3. If you think you may already have a USI Go to the USI website (www.usi.gov.au) and follow the steps under Student-Check if I have a USI and email to jane.waddleton@daramalan.act.edu.au

If you have any questions, please contact Jane Waddleton on 6163 6533 or via email.

N.B. Students may take a photo of the family Medicare card, including expiry date on their phone and bring to Ms Waddleton who will help them set up their USI.

AUSTRALIAN SCHOOL BASED APPRENTICESHIPS (ASBAs)

Australian School Based Apprenticeships (ASBAs) help practical minded students start in their chosen career path whilst studying for a Year 12 Certificate. When the student finishes their Year 12 studies, the ASBA is converted into a full-time apprenticeship with their employer. The types of industry may include carpentry, plumbing, electrical (and refrigeration), landscaping, aged care, childcare, business services, information technology, commercial chef and many more occupations.

Year 10, 11 or 12 students who are considering an ASBA in 2022 should see Ms Waddleton for an informal chat and general information. Parents are welcome to attend a meeting.

It is highly recommended that students commence work experience with a potential employer to see if they have a good working relationship and if this is a trade they wish to follow prior to signing into an ASBA.

Note: It is recommended that students gain a **White Card** and have completed an **Asbestos Awareness Training Course**. These courses are **compulsory** for students who wish to carry out work experience in the field of construction.

Obsession is the story of a girl struggling through an eating disorder. While this isn't something I struggle with personally, the lived experience



A message from the University Admissions Centre (UAC)

- November round 2 SRS offers - 25 November 2021
- December round 1 SRS offers - 9 December 2021
- December round 2 - cancelled
- January round 1 - SRS offers - 13 January 2022
- Change of preference deadline for January round 2 - 21 January 2022 (midnight)
- January round 2 first ATAR based offers - 26 January 2022
- February round 1 offers - 3 February 2022
- February round 2 offers - 10 February 2022
- February round 3 offers - 17 February 2022
- March round 1 offers - 3 March 2022

Educational Access Schemes - A reminder that EAS applications and documents must be submitted by Friday 17 December to be considered in January Round 2 offers and to receive an eligibility letter on Thursday 20 January 2022. The EAS is for applicants who have experienced long-term educational disadvantage, including those effected by natural disasters such as drought or bushfire, or those whose parents or guardians are receiving (or have received) JobKeeper, JobSeeker, COVID-19 Disaster, Jobsaver, or Pandemic leave for at least three months.

ANU Change of preferences

The ANU change of preference window is now open. The order of your preferences is important. **Changing your preferences will impact upon your August offer and could impact your scholarship eligibility.** If you received an early offer directly from ANU, your early offer will be honoured as long as this early offer program remains as your highest eligible preference and you complete Year 12 with an ATAR in 2021. If you change or re-order your preferences, your application will be reassessed in the order of your new preferences. If you are eligible and competitive for a preference which is higher than your early offer preference, your early offer will be replaced with the new offer in December/January, and you will no longer be able to confirm your early offer acceptance. **Please note – if you remove the course for which you were made an August offer from your preference list you will lose your early offer.**

ANU Mandatory Maths and English from 2024

Successful completion in senior secondary Maths and English is mandatory for applications submitted in 2023 for commencement in 2024. You will need to complete:

- At least one English course/unit in at least one

Semester during Year 11 and

- At least one Maths course/unit in at least one Semester during Year 11.

C.A.S Hawker Scholarships

The 2022 C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships open on Monday 6 December and close on Friday 7 January 2022. Each residential scholarship is valued at up to \$60,000 over three years. For more information and to download an application form go to www.hawkersscholarship.org.
