From the Principal



**Dear Parents/
Carers, Staff
and Students,**

We are now three quarters of the way through the term, and it has been wonderful to observe the small number of community activities that

we have been able to hold despite the current restrictions for schools. We look forward to being able to hold our House Cross Country Carnival next Friday 25 March in a Covid-safe way onsite here at the College. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our families, students and staff for the manner in which they have adapted and followed the Health Guidelines for schools, in particular the continuation of mask wearing, cohorting, and visitors

onsite being limited to emergencies only. The Guidelines for Schools are now very different to what is in place for the rest of the ACT community, so I thank you for your continued support in ensuring that we are adhering to the Guidelines. Ensuring the health and safety of all members of our community is our priority. We expect that these Guidelines will continue to be in place for at least the remainder of Term 1.

Lent

On 2 March, we held our Ash Wednesday Liturgy of the Word and distributed ashes in Pastoral Tutor time. In his Lenten message for 2022, Pope Francis reminds us that "Lent is a favourable time for personal and community renewal". He goes on to encourage us to "reflect on Saint Paul's exhortation to the Galatians, 'Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest, if we do not give up. So then, while we have the opportunity

(kairos), let us do good to all' (Gal 6:9-10)." Lent is also a time for reflection on how each of us lives our life, as Pope Francis writes, "Lent invites us to conversion, to a change in mindset, so that life's truth and beauty may be found not so much in possessing as in giving, not so much in accumulating as in sowing and sharing goodness". We are now almost halfway through the Lenten season and we continue to encourage students to not only think of things they can "give up" but also to think of things that they could do more of to help others around them, especially in our Year of the Heart where our focus has been on kindness and doing good for others. There is much chaos, pain and suffering depicted on the news broadcasts and in our daily news feeds from around the world, in Ukraine and Afghanistan, and closer to home, with the flooding disaster in Northern NSW and Queensland. It is heartening and reflective of Pope Francis' Lenten message to see the many gestures of good will and the kindness not only of neighbours but also of complete strangers opening their homes and their communities to refugees fleeing war or natural disaster.

The main focus of the Social Justice group during Lent is supporting Caritas through activities promoting the Project Compassion appeal. A key part of this support comes through our annual Coin Weigh Challenge to be held on Monday 28 March. Students are encouraged to bring in any spare coins they have and donate them during PT lessons.

Our term ends with a Holy Week liturgy on Friday 8 April prior to the holiday break.

2023 Enrolments

Enrolments for Year 7 and 11 2023 have now opened and will close on **Friday 27 May**. Families who are looking to enrol a sibling are reminded that this date applies to current families as well as prospective families seeking a place for 2023. I would encourage current families to submit their enrolment application well before the closing date. Unfortunately, due to the current Health Guidelines for Schools we are not able to hold our Open Evening or the Try Dara Days in a manner that would be Covid-safe and in line with the Guidelines. We will instead be offering a limited number of Covid-safe tours during the first week of the holiday break and early in Term 2 for families who are new to Daramalan and may not have had the opportunity to view our facilities. Bookings are essential for the tours and numbers are limited. All of the key information relating to enrolments, including the online enrolment form, can be found on our College website.

Rapid Antigen Test distribution and Covid-19 notifications

Earlier this week we distributed the Weeks 7 and 8 allocations of the government provided Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs). It is our understanding that these are the final allocation that will be provided to families under the ACT Government's scheme. A reminder for those families whose student may have been absent when the tests were distributed over the past few weeks, they are to collect their allocation from the Student Office upon their return to school.

Thank you to those families who have been following the protocols and processes that we have in place should your student be identified as a close contact or test positive for Covid-19. Please continue to use the secure form found on Daranet to notify the College.

A reminder to please keep your student at home when they are sick or unwell. Students who are unwell must not attend the College and are encouraged to get tested using the RAT provided or undertake a PCR test. While at school, students experiencing symptoms compatible with Covid-19 (eg fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, upset stomach/abdominal pains) will be directed to First Aid and will be isolated with appropriate supervision and collected by a parent/carer as soon as possible. At no time will a staff member perform a rapid antigen test on a student at the College.

Parent Teacher Evenings

Due to the current Health Guidelines for Schools, the Parent Teacher Evenings will be held online via Teams. Information as to the booking process and format for the evenings will be sent in the coming days. We would encourage students to attend these meetings with their parents/carers to discuss their learning journey with their teachers.

From the Counsellors

How students can stay centered in the face of distressing world events.

As a plugged-in online world, we are more connected than ever before. News cycles play out 24-7 and we watch in sadness at the destruction of our fellow humans' homes and lives; feeling helpless, feeling despair, feeling anger and grief - sharing the distress of people who just want to live in peace – as we all do.

In recent online threads regarding our collective distress arising from events in Ukraine, there has been concerning criticism of support tips for distressed news consumers. Critics suggest that such tips designed to alleviate distress are self-indulgent and vapid; considering that while we sit comfortably in our lounge rooms, able to turn off our televisions and the horrible news, Ukrainian and Russian families are not.

It is important to be mindful that while we may not live in Ukraine, as observers we are at risk of experiencing genuine distress from the images we see (vicarious trauma).

As we observe from afar - aghast at the invasion of Ukraine, distress levels rise because we are wired to empathise. Their suffering is our suffering, we are human and we are connected. These feelings are normal responses to abnormal events. It's not wrong to feel upset.

As mental health practitioners - should we give you a list of coping tips?

The reason why mental health practitioners provide support to onlookers away from conflict is because we must all be careful to protect our own mental well-being. If we are not steady – how can we help those who are directly suffering? When we become distressed, our brain gets hijacked by the emotional part of the brain (limbic system), shutting down our clear thinking, problem solving and organizational capacities of the brain (prefrontal cortex).

We look after ourselves so that we can function optimally – retain our capacities and be of service and support to others. This is a gift we can give the people of Ukraine. Standing steady we can harness our energies to help others in need.

There is nothing self-indulgent in taking care of ourselves as we empathically respond with distress to events near or far. It is ok to feel distressed about events - even if you are not there - it is normal to feel sad, and it's ok to find ways to cope or ask for help.



When stressors stack up - what helps?

- Check in with yourself and manage your stress levels with activities that you usually find helpful.
- Be mindful that a cumulative stress effect is possible when negative news updates come close together. Try to limit consumption of the news cycle to once a day and limit social media.
- Avoid graphic visual images of the current conflicts, instead read articles. Discuss what's going on with your family.
- Be aware of the indicators of chronic stress including emerging feelings of anxiety, low mood, sleep disruption, fatigue, poor concentration, irritability, emotional outbursts and withdrawal from usual activities and connections.
- Do remember to support your well-being with basic self-care including good nutrition, regular sleep, daily exercise and connecting with your friends, family and community.
- Plan some fun activities to look forward to.
- Maintain your normal routine - predictability eases stress.
- Other simple stress busters can include listening to music, walking, dancing, playing an instrument, journaling, colouring, cooking, volunteering, meditation, prayer, downloading a mindfulness APP, yoga, watching a movie, having a bath.
- Foster hope within yourself. In the aftermath of tragic events we can be reminded of the goodness of people. Look for the helpers and the people doing kind or heroic things in response to this tragedy.
- Join with your family, church and Daramalan community for prayer.
- Create rituals of solidarity like lighting a candle at home (be mindful of safety).
- Look out for the positive changes that come from tragic events, for example: the mobilisation of aid and support to those people affected by war - it's happening right now.
- Find something positive to do in response, so you feel you make a positive difference in the world; like volunteering in the community to help others or donating money to emergency organisations. Choose to become allies to other people who might be in need of support. If you would like to help in some way - contact your Daramalan Social Justice League Captain **Isaac Jaensch** or **Ms Trish Halangahu**; your local church or Ukrainian community, or aid organisations.
- Remind yourself and others of the goodness of people. The world is largely a safe place, people are usually good, and life is worth living.

If you need extra support, do reach out to a trusted adult or counselling support.

Science

What time is it? Caving time...

Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science students celebrated the start of Week 6 by visiting none other than a cave. Not just any cave, but one that has been forming for the last 410 million years. When our path was stopped by a flooding river, we re-routed and headed off in the opposite direction, finally arriving at Wee Jasper's famous Carey's Cave.

There we met Geoff, who took us on a time-travelling adventure, a time before dinosaurs trekked the Earth, back to the age of fishes (aka the Devonian period). Students explored how Earth systems interact, sedimentary rocks form, and put their geological knowledge to the test.

We had a splendid time examining limestone, and the eerie yet beautiful cave features it forms. After a quick



happy birthday song and blowing out our only light source (Happy Birthday Nicholas!), we then had a BBQ lunch stop at Billy Grace Reserve, where students collected lots of soil for their investigation project.

A special thank you to **Mr Jackson** who was our bus driver for the day. He wins the award for exceptional navigation skills, as he safely delivered us home from our caving adventure.



Learning on Country - Indigenous land use and management practices at Mt Majura

On Monday 21 February, Year 12 Earth Science students learnt from Ngunawal custodian Tyrone Bell about the different resources that can be found in the landscape and how they were used by Aboriginal people for food, fibre, and medicine.

As we walked, Tyrone asked students to experience the landscape with all their senses, to be acutely aware of their surroundings. He pointed out evidence of past land use in the form of scar trees, stone artefacts, and a potential archaeological deposit (PAD). Students had the opportunity to taste the native Cauliflower plant and wash their hands using Lightwood Wattle or 'soap bush'.

During the walk Tyrone explained the importance of Indigenous land management practices such as cool burning to reduce bushfire risk and enhance biodiversity. This experience provided us with valuable insights into traditional land use and how this knowledge can inform sustainable land management practices in future.

Biology Excursion Report

On 18 March, the Year 11 Biology classes ventured off to the stunning Botanical Gardens at Black Mountain, where we observed and explored different ecosystems.

To start the day, we all piled onto the school buses and took the short journey to the gardens. Upon arrival, we prepared for the day by putting on sunscreen and getting our clipboards and booklets. Next on the agenda... the rainforest! As we avidly wandered through vibrant rainforest, we answered questions in our booklets and drew diagrams of what we saw. We listened eagerly as we were taught about the structures of the plants and their purpose in the ecosystem.

Finishing in the rainforest, we made the climb up to the desert. Here, we answered more questions, drew more diagrams, and compared what we saw in the forest and the desert. After exploring the desert and rainforest we ate recess on the grass in the shade of the trees.

After recess, we calculated the area of trees in the nature reserve. This was done using a grid and counting the grid boxes with trees in them. Next, we hiked up through the bush to create quadrants and collect data to calculate and determine the density of trees surrounding Black Mountain Nature reserve. After about an hour of collecting data, we walked back down through the bush and ate lunch at the amphitheater, where we spotted some lizards relaxing in the sun.

Our last activity for the day was a guided tour around the Botanical Gardens. We split into two groups and had Tour Guides to take us around the Gardens. They shared many interesting facts about the gardens and specific plants within. Upon completing the tour, we had the opportunity to ask questions about the day before heading back to school.

Languages

This year, 40 students from the Year 9 to 12 Languages classes took part in the Australian Computational Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO) competition. We had an amazing turnout, with ten teams participating in total, our biggest year yet. We have moved the location of the competition from a classroom to the Flexible Learning Area. The students appreciated the additional space and how it was set up to help them with their tasks.

The contest challenges students to develop their own strategies to decode languages. They work carefully in groups of four to use the skills they develop in their language classes to solve puzzles in languages they have never studied previously. Students have remarked at how exciting it is to use knowledge of grammar structures to figure out meaning to something they have never seen before.

This year, in Round 1 we had two Indigenous languages, Russian and Arhuaco. We look forward to hearing if some of our students have made it to Round 2. Good luck!

Spaghettieis

On a very hot Wednesday afternoon in Week 3, our Year 9 German class was lucky enough to explore the cultural concept of Spaghettieis or ‘spaghetti ice cream’ – something which sounds much less appetising than it is in reality. As part of our current unit on places in the city, we had discussed the cultural phenomenon of the German ice cream shop – Eisdielen – and the incredible array of sundaes and other creations that are available during the Summer months.

Spaghettieis is a visual trick – an ice cream sundae made to look like a plate of spaghetti through the use of a special Spätzle press, some strawberry topping and grated white chocolate. Our students had to use their muscle power to try and get their ice cream through the press and into their bowls, with some being more successful than others. In the end, everyone managed to create their own *Spaghettieis* delight - to varying degrees of success. *Sehr lecker!*

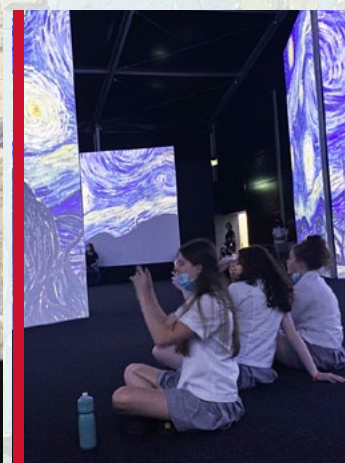
Van Gogh Alive

The Years 11 and 12 Languages students visited the Van Gogh Alive exhibition on Thursday 17 March, which complemented the work students have been doing in each Language class. They are currently studying a unit called Diverse Perspectives. As part of this unit, students have been engaging with artworks to develop an awareness of different perspectives and have been using the target language (French, German or Japanese) to communicate their opinion and understanding of cultural nuances.

The Van Gogh Alive exhibition allowed students to immerse themselves in Van Gogh's paintings which were brought to life through light, film and music. This 'multi-

sensory' experience really showed the impact art, in this case paintings and music, can have on us. We were encouraged to discover new perspectives (as our current study topic suggests) and reflect on our perceptions of the world around us. The immersive Sunflower Room also allowed for some good selfies!

After the exhibition, we spent time in our language groups talking about what we liked and disliked, comparing our experiences and sharing newly found insights.

Facing men with machine guns and a world that really doesn't want to know, the Trojan Women are not just mythic figures of the past as they chant "Bread, Work, Freedom"! (Afghan Women's chant "NON COR ASADEE")

More than a theatre production, "The Trojan Women" by Euripides and adapted by the DTC cast is a call to action to deny legitimacy to anyone that would dehumanise women.

The production is a result of research and linking the original text to current day situations. It is performed by a cast from Daramalan student members of the company; it also involves professional and tertiary level players who are past members of the DTC.

Over the long week-end former DTC student members worked at Burrill Pines Convention Centre and on the beach to create cinematic sequences for the production.

Jack Curry, a professional actor and former student member of the DTC, is playing Poseidon in the cinematic sections. Wynter Grainger, a Classics student and former DTC member, is working in a Dramaturgical role as well as playing Athena in both cinematic and live stage scenes. Tilly Watson, another former DTC student member and later Assistant Director on DTC productions of "The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui", "Hamlet" and "The Crucible", and now a nurse, is both a cast member and a Medical Officer with responsibilities in cast consent issues. Lillia Bank, last seen at DTC as "Mother Courage" in 2019 is now studying theatre at a tertiary level and we are privileged to have her performing one of the "Hecuba" characters. Mel Tsimbas, now at the VCA, has returned to provide essential consultancy work to mentor the young cast. Georgie Wiley and Joey Gardiner were both nominated for CAT awards while at school. Now they have returned to work as Stage Manager and Lighting Director. Other past students with high level skills are working with the company to ensure a high level of proficiency in presenting the DTC's most ambitious production with international ramifications.

With a text written over two and a half thousand years ago, the content is being replayed in real life in Afghanistan and elsewhere at an alarming rate. Now, art, theatre, education and civil responsibility morph into a distillation of concepts on a small stage in the Old Chapel Studio at Daramalan College as The Daramalan Theatre Company (DTC) brings to light the age-old struggle of women in war and its aftermath. And we are left with the question: "So what are you going to do about it?"

Performing Arts – Student Profile

Daniel Baraniecki (Year 10)

What arts subject are you currently studying and why do you love doing it?

I am studying Drama at the moment and it's up there among my favourite classes. I know it sounds cliché, but I really like being able to show another side of me that I don't always get to do in other classes. Being able to apply my experiences to my work is something that I really value when doing Drama. And who am I kidding? The people that you work with are quite like minded and it's great to be able to bounce ideas around and learn with them.

Is there a performer who inspires you and/or influences your work?

I honestly haven't studied many theatre practitioners thoroughly before. I have looked at Brecht and Grotowski, but really, I feel that I learn more by looking at what people around me are doing. We have a lot of hard-working and dedicated people in my class and in the DTC and being able to collaborate with them is something that you don't get to do as much as in other classes.

Where do you see yourself using the skills you've taken from Drama?

In so many areas. I know it seems like the good student thing to say but I already have. In my English class where I

have to do oral presentations is an obvious one, but there are many other places where I have applied the skills I learn through Drama. For example, when producing a performance for your Drama class assessment you need to plan ahead, like a fair bit, as well as meet the deadlines you set for yourself and make sure your work is to the standard you want (just like in other subjects). But what I have really taken from the classes is the ability to reflect and critically think about the work I make and what I can improve on. The systems that our teachers give us to improve our work and reflect upon them are not just applicable to our Drama work but to all our work. I probably won't be working in the acting industry when I am older but the tools and social skills I have learnt through Drama are skills for life.

Is there something that you are currently learning that you are fascinated by?

Somewhat. A lot of what we are

doing revolves around our personal views on the world. We are making pastiches (more movement and physical based theatre) on a social topic. For me it's interesting to see other people's take on society and what we do to change it or subconsciously maintain it.



What is your favourite thing about being involved in the Daramalan Theatre Company (DTC)?

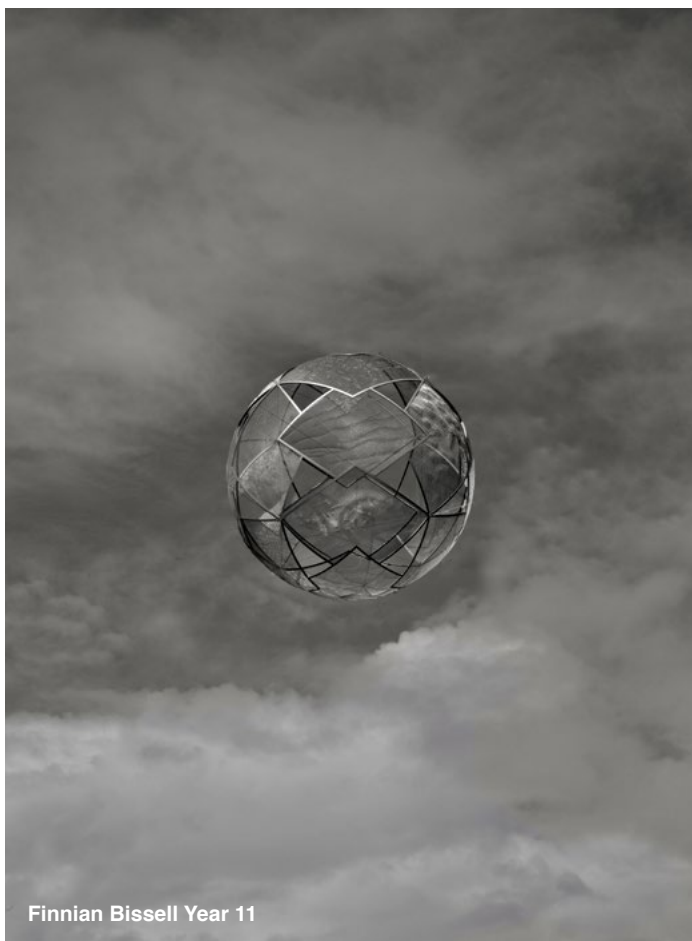
Another cliché, but the community. There is no other community like it. The people you meet come from everywhere. You will have people with varying interests, but all are there for the same reason. Creating performances (as we are now in The Trojan Women) is something that you will only get in Drama. Yes, you can build relationships with people in other places, but it isn't the same. There is a certain vulnerability that all the cast members experience that gives the whole experience a bit extra. It's hard to put it into exact words but it is special and unique to each actor in the cast, and member of the DTC.
