# From the Principal



Dear Parents/ Carers, Staff and Students,

As Term 1 draws to a close, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our students, families and staff for the manner in which they have

embraced and adjusted to the 'new normal' that has come with the shift to 'living with' Covid-19. Whilst the term has been an unsettled one due in most part to many families needing to isolate, in some cases more than once, and has definitely not been the start to our 60th anniversary year that we envisaged, there has still been much to celebrate. The way our College Leaders and House Captains have adapted when we have not been able

to hold our traditional Term 1 activities and events in person is a testament to their leadership and dedication to maintaining our community and sense of belonging. They have been creative and optimistic when developing Covidsafe alternatives and have embraced Online Live Events even when they faced technical hiccups and setbacks. As a College community we were still able to celebrate the commissioning of our student leaders, have held a number of fundraising activities for Social Justice initiatives such as Caritas, year group lunchtime House competitions, successfully completed summer sports seasons for Rowing and Cricket, and we were even able to hold the House Cross Country Carnival here on site. I am hopeful that in Term 2 we will be able to gather once again as a community to begin the term with our ANZAC Day Ceremony and 2022 Heart Photo. us, as a community, following the current health advice and guidelines that will be in place for schools on our return in just over two weeks' time.

#### Health Guidelines moving into Term 2

As of today, I have not received the updated ACT Health Guidelines for Schools that were due to be released by the Chief Health Officer this week. Should these Guidelines include major changes from the current arrangements, this information will be conveyed to families prior to the students returning for Term 2 classes. I anticipate that the wearing of masks, cohorting of students and the requirement to notify ACT Health of the number of Covid-19 cases who were infectious whilst at school will continue into next term.

Thank you to those families who have been following the protocols and processes that we have in place should your student be identified as a close contact or test positive for Covid-19. When we return after the break, please continue to use the secure form found on Daranet to notify the College. As we move into Term 2, a reminder to please keep your student at home when they are sick or unwell. Students who are unwell must not attend the College and should stay home and are encouraged to get tested using the RAT provided or undertake a PCR test. While at school, students experiencing symptoms compatible with Covid-19 (eg fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, upset stomach/abdominal pains) will be directed to First Aid and will be isolated with appropriate supervision and collected by a parent/carer as soon as possible.

#### **Easter Liturgy**

Today we held our Easter Liturgy which reflected on the events of Holy Week. As a community we were reminded that Easter is the most important celebration in the Christian calendar as Jesus' death and resurrection provide us with hope. Given the current global climate and the events in Ukraine, Afghanistan and even closer to home with the flooding on the mid-north coast of NSW, it is vital that we all have hope. We were reminded also, as this Lenten season draws to a close, of Jesus' ultimate sacrifice at Calvary for our salvation. Pope Francis writes in his Lenten message, "Lent is a favourable time for personal and community renewal" and "those who hope in the Lord will regain strength, they will soar on wings like eagles". I wish all families a safe and holy Easter break filled with hope and renewal.

#### Parent-Teacher-Student Evenings

Over the past two evenings our teaching staff have been involved with Parent-Teacher-Student online interviews to complement the feedback beginning to become available to families through Daranet. # Sr Genny Ryan OSU joins our Social Justice meeting

On 24 March, Sr Genny Ryan OSU joined our Social Justice meeting to speak about slavery in the electronics and chocolate industries. Sr Genny, a member of ACRATH, has been coming to Daramalan for a few years to share the stories of those suffering from child slavery around the world, and to show us how our decisions can make a positive impact. In previous years, Sr Genny has discussed the role of child slavery in the cocoa industry in developing nations, where children are deprived of an education, instead being sent to work for little or no money doing dangerous manual labour. This labour often results in the children giving themselves chemical burns, cutting themselves with machetes, and damaging their heads and backs by carrying heavy loads. Within the last decade, there was almost no way of knowing whether or not the chocolates we bought were slavery-free, however the work of people like Sr Genny around the world has led to the development of Fairtrade organisations that ensure the entire chocolate supply chain is free from slavery. In recent years, more and more corporations have signed up to these agreements, with most major chocolate brands trading in Australia now approved by a fairtrade organisation. The best way to end slavery in the chocolate industry for good is to spread the word and make ethical purchases, so when you buy chocolates this Easter, look for these symbols on the packaging, and tell your friends to do the same:

This year, alongside her talk about child slavery in the cocoa industry, Sr Genny introduced us to the growing problem of child labour in the electronics industry, in particular in resource sectors such as cobalt mining. Children in developing nations currently work in dangerous conditions with no WH&S to protect them just to earn enough money to pay for the family's evening meal. This creates a feedback loop, with poverty-stricken families forced to send their children to work to feed the family, thus depriving them of an education and the chance to break the cycle of poverty that they are stuck in. Currently, Sr Genny and other activists are working with the state and federal governments to implement laws that will help to phase out the use of child slavery in the electronics supply chain, in the hope that this will lead to proper pay for adults working in the mining industry in developing nations to allow them to feed their families and send their children to school, breaking the cycle of poverty that is currently caused by unfair labour conditions. Sr Genny says that there is currently no way to check for slaveryfree electronic goods, but by spreading the message and pressuring companies to adopt ethical practices, we can do our bit to help end child slavery. She hopes that in the near future, we will be able to shop for fairtrade electronic goods, just as we do for chocolates. This Easter let's do our bit to educate ourselves and others and make ethical choices to make our world a better, more just place.

#### JUSTICE FOR REFUGEES: END THE CRUELTY

Imagine if you escaped violence and persecution. You'd want to be treated farly in the country you sought safety. But shee 2012, Australia has sent more than 7.000 people seeking asylum to offshore prisons, for committing no crimel Meanwhile, we've subjected 30,000 of those who sought our safety to crueity here onshore. Our country is persecuting them, refusing rearrison with their families. Tocking them up in appalling facilities. Now, the Morrison Government is misleading us again, saying it has 'an additional' 15,000 places' for refugees fleeing the Taliban in Afghanistan. These are not new places, but get carved out from the existing humanitarian places each year. The Government has cut humanitarian places each year. The Government has cut humanitarian resettlement places from 22,000 in 2017 to just 13,750 now, when more people than ever are seeking safety. We demand that these innocent people bure newment protection and family resultion.



#### Speakers at Palm Sunday Rally

Craig foster is a retired soccer player and a human rights activist. He was chief football analyst for the SBS for 18 years. He played with the Socceroos 29 times. He is refougees. Foster has been human rights and refugee Ambassador for Amnesty International and promotes the rights of aylum seekers and refugees in Australia.

Mostala Azimitabar is a Kurdish refugee from Iran. Known as Moz Azimi, he is a musician and activist. After 2,237 days in detention in Australia's immigration system, Moz was released a year ago on a temporary bridging visa. Moz fled racist repression in his homeland to seek safety. Australia locked him up for almost 8 years for no crime. In June last year, Moz performed his music live with rock legends from Midnight OIL Moz now works at the Run for Good Project, a Sydney charly that recycles fumiture for vulnerable people.



#### **Carol Wagner** is a Bishop in the Anglican Church of Australia. She has served as an assistant bishop in the Anglican Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn since February 2020. She is based in Canberra and holds particular responsibility for ministry support and the development of clergy and church workers. She has spoken publicly in support of the rights of asylum seekers and refugees on many occasions.

#### **Partners in Parenting Plus**

Parenting teenagers has never been easy and programs to assist busy parents have not always been easily accessible. In response to this, a new online parenting program has been developed for parents of teenagers. Due to the brain development that occurs in adolescence, the style of parenting used to parent a teenager needs to change from that used to parent a younger child. As your child grows and begins to develop their adult brain, the parent's role shifts. This is made particularly difficult by the natural drift of teenagers away from their parents.

Partners in Parenting + is a new evidence based online parenting program, which is targeted at parents of 12–17 year olds. The program can be done in the privacy and comfort of your own home at your leisure (although, no more than 1 session per week). Parents register and are invited to complete a number of surveys about their teen and their relationship with their teen. From these surveys the program makes recommendations of specific sessions a parent may find useful, such as building a relationship with your teen, boundaries and behaviour expectations, finding the balance you and your teen needs to be safe and "fly the nest", health and mental health, managing conflict in the home and many many more. Parents can choose as many or as few sessions as they are interested in, despite the recommendations.

This new online program is an excellent place to start thoughts about the parenting style and techniques you use for your teen and what changes or refinements can be made. It is an interesting introduction and background to some challenges, but is not able to replace the value of individual meetings with a parenting specialist about your specific family and needs. When engaging in this program, it is important to keep in mind that every family is different and that there is no right or wrong way to parent your child. So, as you work your way through this program, remember that these are tips and strategies that may be of use, but are not "Godspeak" or the only way, not every strategy will work for you or your child. # Mathematics

#### Pi Day 2022

On Tuesday 15 March we started our Pi-Day celebrations. Students were asked to recite at least 20 digits of Pi to earn points for their House in this schoolwide competition. A total of 84 students across all year groups took up the challenge. Due to Covid restrictions, we were only able to check the digits of Pi in year groups, which is why we had a Grand Final on Friday 18 March, where all participants who managed to recite at least 100 digits of Pi got a second chance to improve their score.

There was a strong competition among the 11 finalists and the outcome couldn't have been any more nerve wrecking. In a separate category **Thomas Bridgart** (Year 12 Farrer) was able to recite 100 digits in 24 seconds which is the **new speed record**. For the main competition, which was not time dependent, third place was awarded to **Natalie Gordon** (Year 9 Merrick) who recited 370 digits this year and already continues to prepare herself for next year. **Amelia Cains** (Year 10 Lawson) improved on her previous score to achieve her personal best of 508 digits, and it looked like she was going to be this year's winner if it wasn't for the last competitor **Cameron Gordon** (Year 12 Merrick) who overtook Amelia and recited two more digits of Pi, so 510 digits.

Overall Cuthbert House was awarded Bronze with 16 participants, however, the individual high scores of team Merrick placed them right on Silver and Farrer received Gold with most participants and top scorers.

# Year 12 Earth and Environmental Science – Captains Flat field trip

Year 12 Earth and Environmental Science students put their investigation skills to the test on a field trip to Captains Flat to examine the ongoing impact of the Lake George mine, 60 years after its closure!

The once lively mining town is now a sleepy country town along the Molonglo River, but evidence of its past can be seen across the landscape. After visiting the lookout to see the old mine entrance and poppet head, students travelled upstream to measure the water quality of a pristine location, unaffected by the mine. A variety of scientific methods were used to explore the condition of the water and biodiversity of the river. These were then compared to two locations downstream of the mine. Stark differences in water quality and biodiversity were observed including the most obvious 'yellow boy' - a bright orange/red colour staining the rocks along the river. This 'out of this world' like slime, forms as dissolved metals precipitate out from the water, providing a clear indicator of acid mine drainage.

Despite major remedial works costing the government over \$2.3 million, it was clear from student's research that the mine is continuing to affect the water quality and biodiversity of the river and may do so for decades to come!





# Biology

#### Mulligan's Flat Biology Fieldwork

Year 11 Biologists travelled to Mulligans Flat Woodland Sanctuary last month, to collect data for their major assessment task for Semester 1. Daramalan College is privileged to have a nature reserve so close to our school, to explore and learn about conservation and the work of scientists in the region.

Students designed and conducted an investigation, to evaluate the impact of macropods on plant species diversity. The term macropod is used to describe the marsupial family Macropodidae, which includes kangaroos, wallabies, tree-kangaroos, pademelons, and bettongs. The students accessed two zones of the reserve for comparison. Guided by **Belinda Wilson** an Outreach Officer from the Woodlands and Wetlands Trust, the students learned about working as an Ecologist and the reintroduction of native species like the bettong and quoll onto Ngunnawal Country.

#### **Ostern in Deutschland**

Celebrating Ostern (Easter) in Germany is connected with many traditions and customs. Preparations start weeks before Easter Sunday. As it is spring, people cut branches from trees before Easter and put them into a vase. Slowly the blossoms and new leaves will unfurl and remind people that the long winter is over. The branches are then decorated with hand painted wooden eggs or hollowed out real eggs. In the same way, trees and bushes outside the house are also decorated with plastic, wooden or real painted eggs and wreaths. The Ostereier (Easter eggs) are often decorated by the families and passed down over generations. Students in the Year 10 German class have tried their hands at this century old tradition and created some really beautiful eggs.

This year, forty students from the Year 9 to 12 Languages classes took part in the Australian Computational Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO) competition - Round 1 (Regional) in Week 5. Just to enter this tough competition is quite an achievement. But one team made it through to the National stage, which was held at the ANU in Week 8. Congratulations to our Year 10 team - Daniel Baraniecki, Kenneth Le, Lucy O'Neil, and Aimee Perrett, who worked very hard to get to the next round of the competition. Thank you also to Ronja Staerker-Ashby and Gemma Weller who filled in at the last minute to cover unexpected absences.

Here are some comments from our students. I absolutely loved getting to compete in OzClo, it was an adventure I'm glad I took part in. #### **Y8** Puppets

Students in Year 8 Technologies study Design and Technology whilst following the design process using different mediums to achieve a design brief. Using their creative design skills, students have been able to manufacture a hand puppet using equipment in a Textiles workroom. Equipment not normally used by Year 8 students, they were able to accurately cut fabric, operate and thread a sewing machine and improve on the original design to create a range of artistic hand puppets.

#### From Myths to Realities

The Trojan Women Challenges for Action

If a theatre company comprised of young people is going to be political and presenting theatre as a call to action, then they have to be good ... and very good! One can get away with naïve performances of standard and stock productions and people will generally accept them from students. However, once you step up into the political and social arena where you are offering a call to action, you MUST be very good and professional in what you do.

Daramalan Theatre Company has taken decisive action in developing strategies to ensure a distinctive quality in a potentially influential work. The goal is for a professional standard theatre production that will be up to the audience to judge and follow up with action inspired by the performance.

Yes indeed! "The Trojan Women" by Euripides is as much a ceremony as it is theatre. The intensity engendered by the young cast in rehearsals is stunning to behold. It ensures presentational performances like very few seen in Canberra over recent years. All cast members are committed to the call to action; and are unapologetic in utilising theatre to provoke and challenge communities for action on the plight of women in Afghanistan.

We have implemented a highly disciplined approach with a published "Rules for the Theatre" which aims for professionalism in outcome, procedures and interactions. Its strongest feature is that "all participants become practiced in the use of silence for the duration of the rehearsal or workshop" after having entered in silence. Speaking is only done while actually rehearsing or engaged in a work-related discussion. This strategy promotes reverence for the work and for the process. Audiences will feel this sense of reverence when they also enter the space.

So yes! It is serious. Doing Tragedy is always going to be serious. But Tragedy in the Greek and later Shakespearean sense also has a release purpose; something good and of great value comes from the ultimate demise of tragic heroes. Our production aims for no less. It is a call to action. So our cast is having to learn the value of ethical and professional standards in process and application. They aim to use their performance skills to compel audience attention to the details of their theatrical exploration and presentational aspects. They aim to be credible.

But all is not too dour. The bar (with a permit to serve alcohol) opens at 6.45pm for audiences to buy a drink and perhaps a snack to see them through the evening. The show runs from 7.30pm for approximately 75 - 80 minutes. There is no interval.

Book now for an unforgettable night of professionally inspired theatre that might well enrich the spirit.
