I would like to especially acknowledge our College Student Leadership team, who, in just a few short weeks, have already been able to bring together our community. they have truly embraced their roles. Lent

of Lent, especially the annual Coin Weigh Challenge on **Friday 31 March**.

In his Lenten message, **Pope Francis** describes Lent as a season when “the Lord takes us with him to a place apart. While our ordinary commitments compel us to remain in our usual places and our often repetitive and sometimes boring routines, during Lent we are invited to ascend “a high mountain” in the company of Jesus and to live a particular experience of spiritual discipline – asceticism – as God’s holy people.” He goes on to convey Jesus’ desire of shared experience “just as our whole life of faith is an experience that is shared. For it is in togetherness that we follow Jesus. Together too, as a pilgrim Church in time, we experience the liturgical year and Lent within it, walking alongside those whom the Lord has placed among us as fellow travellers. Like the ascent of Jesus and the disciples to Mount Tabor, we can say that our Lenten journey is “synodal”, since we make it together along the same path, as disciples of the one Master.” This year, **Archbishop Christopher** has invited the Archdiocese to join together in this spirit of synodality, for a year of walking together. Each day, especially during Lent, we are reminded of both Pope Francis and Archbishop Christopher’s words of walking together and living a shared experience, especially of those who are experiencing hardship through poverty, displacement as a result of natural disaster or war. I am extremely proud of the generosity of our students and staff as they go about their day to day activities here at the College as people of heart in the spirit of the MSCs.

On Thursday 2 March, **Fr Kimi MSC** celebrated our annual Family Mass. As always it was a beautiful occasion where we were able to gather with our families. Thank you to Ms **Cheryl Hamill** (AP Mission), our Mission Captain **Ella Harries**, the Liturgy Committee and all those who played a role in preparing and who participated in the Mass. Thank you especially to our families who joined us on the evening.

Our term ends with a Holy Week Liturgy on Thursday 6 April, just prior to the Easter weekend and the term break.

2024 Enrolments and Open Evening

Enrolments for Year 7 and 11 2024 opened on Tuesday 14 March and will close on **Friday 26 May**. Counselling Team

Introducing the Daramalan Counselling Team for 2023

As part of the Pastoral Care Program, students at Daramalan College have access to the school's counselling service. CatholicCare Canberra & Goulburn (CCG) are contracted by Daramalan to provide a counselling service to students and their families on site. There is no fee to access this service.

This year, Daramalan College has three Counsellors on the counselling team, who share a passion for working with young people and their families.



Sarah Foley (6245 6396): Sarah is a registered Psychologist, with a background in marketing, community based aged care, crisis counselling and the homelessness sector. She has worked with the CatholicCare School and Family Counselling Program since 2006. This is her 6th year at Daramalan College. In 2023, she will be working on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays.



Sarah O'Sullivan (6245 6312): Sarah is a Social Worker who has worked predominantly with adolescents and their families since the early 90's. She has worked with the CatholicCare School and Family Counselling Program since 2000 when she arrived in Canberra. This is her 8th year at Daramalan College. In 2023, she will be working on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays.



Deb Nelson (6245 6534): Deb is a Counsellor and Social Worker, with 26 years' experience in individual, family and group counselling with children and their families in New Zealand and Australia. She has worked with the CatholicCare School and Family Counselling Program since 2019. This is her first year at Daramalan College. In 2023, she will be working on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

What we do:

School counselling is voluntary, and we have strict rules around privacy and confidentiality. There are some exceptions to confidentiality, and we will explain these when we first meet a student.

The role of the Counsellor is to focus on the emotional, social, and educational well-being of the students. Our Counsellors welcome contact with students having difficulty with some part of their life, whether or not it affects their schoolwork.

The problem does not have to be a big one. It is better to seek help sooner than later. Some typical concerns that Counsellors work with include anger, anxiety, behavioural problems, depression, eating problems, family breakdown and family conflict, grief and loss, learning and educational challenges, parenting challenges, peer and other social relationships, school avoidance, stress and study skills.

How to get an appointment

Students can either refer themselves, or be referred by family, school staff or other agencies. The referral process differs depending on the age of the student:

Students over 14 years of age can refer themselves or be referred by teachers or parents/caregivers. Students and staff can make bookings directly on the online Book Now page which is under the "Student" tab of Daranet. Students, staff and parents/caregivers are also welcome to contact the Counsellors on the email: Counsellor@daramalan.act.edu.au

Students under 14 years of age require parental consent to access the school Counsellor. For separated families this involves consent from both parents unless there are orders in place advising otherwise. Consent is gained digitally through our digital referral form, which is available from any of the school Counsellors.

Where to find more information and helpful resources

On the "Student" tab in Daranet there is an option for "Counselling". When students go to this page, they will find more detailed information about the counselling services. The counselling page also has a number of resources with different ideas for addressing some of the common issues students face. Students are very welcome to explore these resources as and when they wish.

Pi Day



Earth and Environmental Science

Exploring Sustainability and Water Management at the Arboretum

Nature is the best classroom, particularly in Earth and Environmental Science! On Wednesday 15 February, Year 12 Earth Science students visited the National Arboretum as part of their 'Living on Earth' unit which explores the importance of managing the Earth's resources sustainably to ensure Earth systems are protected and human communities can thrive.

With over 44 000 rare and endangered trees across the site, the Arboretum plays an important role in preserving biodiversity whilst also providing a place for recreation, scientific research, and education. Throughout the morning, students undertook a guided walk where they heard about the history of the Arboretum from its use as a meeting place by Indigenous people, to early settler farming land at Dairy Hills, to the pine plantations, the devastating impact of the 2003 bushfires, to its current

use today. They learnt about how the design of the Arboretum was informed by detailed soil mapping, an understanding of the needs of each species, and how water travels through the landscape to ensure each forest was planted correctly. Established during the millenium drought, students also learnt about the different sources of water used to irrigate the site and how these must be managed carefully.

Finally as they progressed through each forest, students heard about how nature-based solutions have been implemented to carefully manage pests such as waiting for the Silver Birch to release a chemical to attract lady beetles who eat aphids, rather than using pesticides, the planting of lucerne to fix nitrogen and break up compacted soil structure, or the protection of rocky knolls to ensure small bird species thrive and feast on pest insects.

This is the first of many Earth and Environmental Science field trips this year, look out for them in each Daranews. Next, we are off to the Botanical Gardens to go pond dipping!



Earth Science is at it again...off to see the caves!

Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science students celebrated the start of Week 6 by visiting none other than Carey's Cave in Wee Jasper.

There we met **Geoff**, who took us on a time-travelling adventure, a time before dinosaurs trekked the Earth, back to the age of fishes to the Devonian Period (400 million years ago). Each step we took across the landscape represented a whopping 10,000 years of history that had passed.

Students explored how Earth systems interact, sedimentary rocks like limestone form, and put their geological knowledge to the test.

We had a splendid time examining limestone, and the eerie yet beautiful cave features it forms. After tasting the pristine cave water and a quick mathematical lesson on how many candles it takes to see a cave, we headed off back to Canberra.

A special thank you to **Mr Matthew Webbie**, who came along with us on the trip.





Geography

Our Great Southern Land

Year 9 and 10 Geography students recently had the opportunity to visit the Great Southern Lands exhibition at the National Museum of Australia. The exhibition showcased the unique geography and diverse cultural heritage of Australia through the themes of power, connection, life and change. Students were able to explore the interactive displays and exhibits, gaining a deeper understanding of the landforms, climate and ecosystems of Australia.

They also learnt about the rich cultural history of Australia, including the stories and traditions of our Indigenous peoples. Throughout the exhibition, students considered their own connection to our ancient great southern land and reflected on the Australian continent's capacity for transformation and regeneration in response to the impact of human activity. The visit was an engaging and powerful experience for all involved, and we thank the National Museum of Australia for hosting us.



Legal Studies

Parliament House and the High Court

To learn about the separation of powers, Year 11 and 12 Legal Studies classes toured both Parliament House and the High Court of Australia during Week 3.

The Year 11 Legal Studies class were also able to witness Question Time, and particularly enjoyed the theatrics and jovial clash of ideas. The students were impressed with both major parties, particularly the humour and responses of Prime Minister, **Anthony Albanese**, the confidence of **Clare O'Neil** (Minister for Home Affairs), the questions of **Melissa McIntosh**, and the preamble of Opposition Leader, **Peter Dutton**.



Students from both Years 11 and 12 were able to see the High Court in action, as they either watched a challenge about electric vehicle excise or an Application for Special Leave to Appeal argument by high profile Barrister, **Bret Walker SC**.

We thank the staff of these critical institutions for their time and willingness to engage with our senior students.



Lyons Excursion to Old Parliament House

Lyons House attends Commemorative Statue Unveiling Ceremony

On Wednesday 8 March, **Ms Louise Chapman** and **Mr Andrew Withers** had the honour of taking a handful of Lyons House representatives to a special ceremony outside Old Parliament House. It was a wonderful occasion, celebrating the first two women to be elected to Federal Parliament: **Dame Dorothy Tangney** and **Dame Enid Lyons**. This event was hosted by the Hon **Kristy McBain MP** and coincided nicely with International Women's Day. To acknowledge their significant contribution to Australian politics and their immense contribution to our history and way of life, the National Capital Authority, on behalf of the Australian Government, commissioned sculptures honouring the women to be erected within the National Triangle, next to Old Parliament House. The sculptures are beautiful bronze statues and were created by Melbourne Sculptor **Lis Johnson**. Our Lyons students and staff were excited to be included in this significant occasion and enjoyed meeting some politicians as well as a delightful breakfast in the garden afterwards. What Arts subjects are you currently studying and why do you enjoy them?


I am currently studying Music, Visual Art and Photography. I love these subjects as they allow me to communicate my thoughts, ideas and feelings through various mediums of expression.

What are some of the experiences and opportunities you have had within the Music Program?




Cressida

Given a voice

Mia Burton (Year 12) interviews **Kathleen Dunkerley** (Year 11) who plays Cressida in the new Daramalan Theatre Company's production of "Troilus and Cressida". Mia herself plays three challenging roles in the production. It is International Women's Day and Cressida provides a powerful provocation for a young Actor playing her.

Mia: Would you say Cressida is a feminist? How does Cressida relate to modern day feminism?

Kathleen: Cressida is a survivor, aware of her privilege and how fragile it can be. If she were to fight against this patriarchal society by 'traditional feminist standards', her privileges would shrink and her ability to survive would be threatened. She does, however, struggle within the bounds of the patriarchal world she lives in. She gets frustrated by the way of the world, by the positions of women, and by men: their treatment of women, their lack of awareness about women's struggles, and their unconscious ways of thinking that force women into the positions they then ridicule them for. And she definitely longs for a world where people are seen for their strengths and not their genders. So, while she doesn't actively fight for equality like a modern feminist might be expected to, she definitely has a feminist mindset.

Mia: Was Cressida "before her time"? Why/why not?

Kathleen: When looking at leading women in Shakespeare's plays, your first instinct might be to say that Cressida was before her time, however, that perspective is looked at with modern bias. Contextually, Cressida was regarded as an insignificant woman and was rarely ever played as anything else before modern times. Shakespeare had a tendency to naturally write complex characters, the complexities of which might not be seen or become relevant until centuries after they were written. I believe Cressida is one of these characters. Through a modern interpretation, Cressida is an intelligent, complex, flawed woman, and the media are starting to show these types of characters now more than ever. But women have always been complex, and intelligence and flaws are not new inventions. I think Cressida wasn't before her time but is a timeless woman.

Mia: Is Cressida a victim?

Kathleen: Yes. A thousand times yes, in so many ways. She is a victim of her circumstance, the victim of her society and the men who see her as an object, and a victim of the Greek camp who consistently deny her autonomy over her body, and her consent. (Spoiler Alert!)

Mia: How can young people look up to Cressida?

Kathleen: I believe while Cressida is definitely a product of her harsh environment, her intelligence, resilience and self-awareness through it all is admirable. As a young woman herself, she still struggles with identity and where

her moral compass lies, especially under unbelievably stressful circumstances. Yet, she maintains an element of herself through it all, though it may seem under the surface.

Mia: What are her values?

Kathleen: Her circumstances have forced her to value some things above others. She constantly checks herself to remain calm, but her aggression slips through the cracks, sometimes through witty and potentially snarky comments, sometimes through fits of hysteria. She mistrusts her heart and says to value logic over desire, though her actions speak louder, and she ends up confused, betrayed and more controlled than ever before. Ultimately, she values survival, independence and freedom, though she is still growing and can be confused about what she wants, as she struggles at times to find the 'right' path to take.

Mia: Thank you Kathleen. We will look forward to seeing you in the production.


