College Hours of Supervision and Change to Uhr Information Centre Hours in Term 2

With days becoming shorter and more training occurring after school, this is a timely reminder to parents and students regarding what supervision is provided before and after normal school hours for the safety of students. Note that from the start of Term 2, the Uhr Information Centre will have a slight change in the hours of supervision offered.

- Active staff supervision is from 8:25am to 3:40pm onsite each day.
- Supervision is provided at organised school events such as rehearsals, trainings or excursions.
- The Uhr Information Centre is supervised from 8:15am to 4:45pm Monday to Thursday and 8:15am to 4:30pm on Fridays. From the start of Term 2, The Uhr Information Centre is supervised from 8:15am to 4:30pm Monday to Friday.
- Supervision is provided in the Sports Centre during the Winter sports season from 3:30pm to 6.00pm Monday to Thursday where there is a First Aid qualified member of staff available.
- Reception is staffed from 8.30am to 4.30pm each day, after this time there is no active supervision of the pick-up area at the front of the College.

The College does not provide supervision and is not responsible for students who are onsite outside of our active supervision roster and who are not participating in an organised school event. In this circumstance, students are onsite at their own risk.

We encourage our students to always be responsible and vigilant to ensure safety onsite and around the College grounds. When travelling to and from school, students are asked to travel in groups where possible, notify their parents of their travel paths, maintain awareness of surroundings and report concerns promptly to the College. We do not recommend students being at Dickson before or after school for prolonged periods of time.

Science

Parent: What did you learn at school today? Student: silence....ummmmmmmm?!

As you walk down the Ross and Dempsey corridors the classrooms are buzzing with equipment going in and out, experiments literally lighting up the room, class debates/ discussions and perhaps the occasional Kahoot theme song encouraging some competitive demonstration of key concepts. But...... by the time our learners get home they're exhausted from a day of new information, critical thinking and collaboration. Try these conversation starters to get further insights into their day:

Year 7: Michelangelo, Rembrandt, da Vinci – all amazing artists with a talent for drawing! Our Year 7s have been learning about how to draw equipment in Science – luckily, we don't need masterpieces – just follow the rules – ask your Year 7 what are these rules? (Hint: use a sharp pencil, no shading, use a ruler for straight lines, simple outlines.)










Year 8: What if your local takeaway could make a burger with meat produced without any animals having to die? Recently scientists discovered a way to make meat from just a few cells. Ask your Year 8 student if they would be happy to eat it? (Hint: ask them why or why not? This is a more humane way to produce meat and cost effective.)





Year 9: Right now, your body is under attack from invading pathogens e.g. bacteria and viruses – list ways your body is trying to keep them out. (Hint: there are a number of physical and chemical barriers e.g. skin, mucous, stomach acid, saliva that make up the first line of defence.)

Year 10: May the Force be with you! Perhaps the most famous quote from the Star Wars saga – ask your Year 10 student about why they might be saying it in class (Hint: Newton's 2nd law of motion, this law describes the affect of a net force and mass upon the acceleration of an object.)


What time is it? Caving time.....

Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science students celebrated the start of Week 5 by visiting Carey's Cave in Wee Jasper, which has been forming for the last 410 million years.

There we met **Geoff**, who took us on a time-travelling adventure, a time before dinosaurs trekked the Earth, back to the age of fishes (aka the Devonian period). Students explored how Earth systems interact, sedimentary rocks form, and put their geological knowledge to the test.

We had a splendid time examining limestone, and the eery yet beautiful cave features it forms including fossils of coral and aquatic snails.

A special thank you to Mr **Bruce Morton** who was our bus driver for the day. We are looking forward to our next field trip to Sydney to collect data for our investigations!

Year 12 Earth and Environmental Science

Our Earth and Environmental Science students were off to the National Arboretum which is a mosaic of living forests and gardens. It has more than 44,000 rare and endangered trees, some of which are extinct in the wild, like Franklinia Alatamaha pictured below with students. Did you know that Walter Burley Griffin's plans for Canberra had an arboretum, and he even collected acorns which were planted at the arboretum and are over 100 years old now?

The amazingly knowledgeable **Heather Tregoning** took us on a behind the scenes sustainability tour where we explored the water supply, and the strategies and systems put in place to manage water onsite.



Mulligans Flat

In a picturesque excursion to Mulligans Flat, Year 11 Biologists embarked on a mission to delve into the intricacies of biodiversity conservation. Equipped with quadrats and clipboards, they eagerly anticipated the opportunity to collect vital data amidst the lush surroundings of the nature reserve. However, nature had its own plans, as dark clouds loomed overhead and raindrops began to fall.

Undeterred by the downpour, the students pressed on, their determination matched only by their enthusiasm for scientific inquiry. Despite the inclement weather, the quadrat studies proceeded - within each square metre of ground, students meticulously recorded the abundance and distribution of plant species within their assigned quadrats. As the rain continued to fall, the students found themselves immersed not only in data collection but also in the profound realisation of nature's resilience. They witnessed firsthand the tenacity of ecosystems, as plants and animals persevered despite human activity compacting the ground, eroding embankments and leaving nutrient poor soils. Mulligans Flat is a living laboratory that works to conserve plant and animal species endemic to Australia. By comparing zones within the reserve, students can evaluate the impact of kangaroos on the distribution and abundance of plant species.









Is your student a 'Sleek Geek'?

As advertised in our Daily Notices – The Australian Museum wants to give out some cash prizes! Ask your student about it – maybe they need a little nudge to have the confidence to give it a go!

Sponsored by the University of Sydney, the Sleek Geeks Science Eureka Prize encourages students to communicate about a scientific concept in a way that is accessible and entertaining to the public while painlessly increasing their science knowledge i.e. learn something without even noticing! The theme this year is ENERGY – entries close Friday 12 April. A link is in the daily notices for more information.

Kosciuszko Field Trip

Year 8 Geography Field Trip to Kosciuszko National Park

Our Year 8 Geography students recently enjoyed a field trip to Kosciuszko National Park, where they investigated the alpine environment firsthand. Throughout the day, students tested their field skills, calculating tree height, drawing quadrat sketches, and recording important observations of the changing weather.

As we moved uphill from Sawpit Creek to Charlotte Pass, students studied the changes that occur to the flora and fauna, observed how human activities impact each site, and heard from the National Park Rangers about important management strategies implemented to protect the precious alpine area. This practical experience enriched students' understanding of our landscapes and landforms unit and helped foster a greater appreciation for the Snowy Mountains region.



















UN Youth Listening Tour

On Wednesday 28 February, Daramalan had the joy of hosting **Gavin Choong**, Australia's 2024 United Nations Youth Representative. Gavin came to share all his wonderful ideas about connecting young Australians to the decision makers in charge of fronting global issues. He spent some time talking to interested students about the functions of UN programs in and outside of Australia. We were then able to talk through what we consider to be positive attributes of Australian society, and what we feel could be improved on or developed more in the future.

Gavin announced that he's got many exciting plans this year as the Youth Representative of Australia! His session with us was part of a much more widescale project he's termed the 'Listening Tour'. This involves him travelling across Australia, to speak with various schools all over the country regarding their opinions on topical world issues. Following this, in September his findings will be presented to the UN General Assembly in New York as an insight into what Australia's youth think about the goals we've set for ourselves. These goals will then be revised into more productive solutions, hopefully paving the way to meeting them by the year 2030!

This was a really cool session, which even involved adding to a collaborative nation-wide playlist! I'm excited for any updates on Gavin's quest of attempting to listen to the many young voices of Australia!

French Exchange Student Visit











Twenty-four students and two teachers from our sister school, the Lycée Jacques Coeur in Bourges, in the Loire Valley in central France, visited Canberra between Friday 23 February and Wednesday 6 March. The French students spent some days at Daramalan attending classes with their host students, but also visited the War Memorial, Parliament House, the Botanical Gardens and the Australian National Museum.

The Daramalan host students and their Lycée Jacques Coeur guests spent Tuesday 27 February at Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve outside Canberra. This was a big treat for the visiting students: in addition to seeing koalas and rock wallabies, they also saw two kangaroos fighting, as well as a red belly black snake!

On Monday 4 March, the French students attended Year 10, 11 and 12 French classes, giving Daramalan French

students the opportunity to converse with native French speakers. Year 10 French did a Kahoot in French, on French speaking countries and Australian Trivia, where the French and Australian students really had to work together to find the answers. This class finished with a tasting of Australian foods. The Tim Tams, fairy bread, meat pies and lamingtons were very popular - but the quests treated the vegemite scrolls with more caution!

We said goodbye to them early on the morning of Wednesday 6 March. When asked about the impact of the exchange, the Daramalan students said that their interaction with native speakers greatly improved their own French comprehension, fluency and vocabulary; and gave them a new appreciation for French customs and traditions. All the students built meaningful connections with peers from diverse backgrounds, developing new global friendships.


Students Celebrate International Womens Day
