From the Principal




Dear Parents/ Carers, Staff and Students.

As the term comes to an end and the warm weather is upon us, there has been no shortage of activity and buzz about the College.

Over the past few weeks, Year 9 and 10 have participated in their Reflection Days, the DaraSevens competition was a hard fought intellectual battle in the final between Lawson and Merrick, and we celebrated National Health and PE Day with activities and healthy smoothies. I can hardly believe that we are already at the end of Term 3, and I am sure if the year so far is anything to go by, we will soon be at the end of another school year, wondering where the time has disappeared to.

Last Friday we had the pleasure of announcing our 2025 Student Leaders our whole-school Leadership Assembly. The Leaders announced join a rich history of outstanding leaders who have served the Daramalan community. I would like to acknowledge all of the students who applied and put themselves forward to be considered for a leadership position in 2025, be it as a Peer Support Leader, House Captain, Portfolio or College Captain. We are truly blessed as a community to have the depth of talent and willingness of our students who value and take on these roles. To those students who were not successful in obtaining a formal leadership role, know that leadership exists across all facets of our community and you do not need to hold a formal leadership position to lead. As a College founded in the traditions of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, we are part of the larger Chevalier family that extends across the globe. I have written before about the founder of the MSCs, Fr Jules Chevalier and the important place that he holds in not only our community, but MSC communities and schools around the world. Jules Chevalier first dreamed of a group of people dedicated to the Heart of Jesus who would bring a message of love and hope. From the beginning, Fr Chevalier understood the Devotion to the Sacred Heart in a broad sense. He lived it as a spirituality that comprised all aspects of faith, religion and daily life-social life as well as personal life. Fr Hans Kwakman msc, wrote that "Fr Chevalier practiced the Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus by wholeheartedly engaging himself in the occupations of his daily life....his spirituality was practical and down to earth." We should not, however, according to Fr Kwakman, put him on a pedestal. "He was an ordinary man with ordinary talents. He had flaws in his character, and he certainly made mistakes in carrying out his leadership functions. However, what made him special was his total commitment to the cause of Jesus, whom he called "the Sacred Heart". He devoted himself without reserve to the spreading of the Devotion to the Sacred Heart, so that Jesus, the Sacred Heart, would be known and loved, everywhere." That is why we are here today as a Catholic College in the MSC tradition.

Each and every day I see examples of unassuming, servant leadership, just as Fr Chevalier envisaged when he established the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, through the actions of our students, staff and wider community. From the House and Social Justice group fundraising and raising awareness, sleeping out for the Vinnies Sleepout,

walking around Lake Burley Griffin as part of the Charity Walk, through to coming along on a weekend to support the College's sporting teams, our Eagle mascot front and centre, as they reach the finals in their respective sports. At our assembly, we heard from Canberra Raider, Jamal Fogarty, and the importance of family in shaping his leadership both on and off the sporting field. We were also able to recognise four of our unassuming leaders through the Long Tan Leadership and Teamwork Awards and the ADF Future Innovator Awards. These awards were presented by Leading Aircraftman Max Kaval. Congratulations to the recipients of the Long Tan Award for Leadership and Teamwork, Lachlan English (Year 12) and Aidan Wunsch (Year 10), and the ADF Future Innovator Award, Kenneth Le (Year 12) and Thomas Neighbour (Year 10). The assembly also provided an opportunity for me to present three of our students with Principal Awards in recognition of their Australian representation: Luka Jukic (U16 Football), **Tom Covey** (U15 Hockey), and **Charlotte** Seymour (Fonteyn Ballet).

Charity Walk

On Friday 13 September we were able to hold our annual Charity Walk along an adjusted course around Lake Burley Griffin. The change to the route to incorporate Weston Park and end at the College Rowing Shed was well received by both students and staff on the day, many of whom commented that it was more scenic than the traditional course. The monies raised through donations will be distributed to two charities: MacKillop House and St Nick's Young Carers Program. Year 12 AST Examinations

I would like to commend the Year 12 Tertiary students on the manner in which they sat their AST Examinations on Tuesday 3 September and Wednesday 4 September. The feedback from the external supervisors was that they were once again extremely impressed by the maturity of our students. The students were positive and upbeat both before and after the exams. Our thanks are extended to the Pastoral Team who were on hand to provide the traditional breakfasts each morning which contributed to the positive and community feeling amongst the group. I would like to acknowledge the work of Ms Heike Craig and Mr Nic Whatman in ensuring that the students were well-prepared for the exams. A large number of our students have since received early offers to university, however, it was pleasing to observe that the students still recognised the significance that these exams play in the two-year process towards the calculation of an ATAR.

Student Leave Requests

As we move into the final term of the school year, a reminder for families that should a student need to be away for **5 or more school days** for reasons other than sickness, prior approval from the Principal must be sought in writing via a letter or an email. This includes where a student is absent due to their participation in representative sporting teams and competitions. The request needs to be submitted in sufficient time so that arrangements regarding missed schoolwork and assessment can be made. The preferred email address for such requests is principal@daramalan.act.edu.au.

Students in Years 11 and 12 should be aware that there are strict requirements for attendance stipulated by the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies in order for students to gain credit for a unit of work. Any extended absences from school may have an impact on the student's ability to be assessed even if all the assessment tasks for the unit are completed. Students should seek advice from the Assistant Principal Curriculum Years 11-12, Mr Steven Carroll, prior to making plans to miss any school days.



Parking, Blocking Driveway Access, No Stopping Zones and Supporting Student Safety

Access Canberra have continued to monitor speeding and parking by mobile speed vans and licence plate recognition vehicles around the College, and I anticipate that this will continue into the new school term. Unsafe and illegal parking can reduce visibility of our students and motorists to see each other, creating a significant hazard when students cross the road. Please remember not to park across pedestrian crossings, in no stopping zones, on corners, verges or double parking.

I would like to reiterate my previous requests that people who are dropping off their students in the morning, and/ or picking up students in the afternoon do not park on the nature strips of houses near the College or across driveway entrances. Unfortunately, we continue to receive complaints from our neighbours about damage done to grass and trees as well as access being blocked when they have attempted to exit or enter their property. We wish to maintain positive relationships with our neighbours, so we ask that you assist by respecting their space and their requests in relation to access to their properties. Please also be mindful when picking up students that you are not parked or stopping in a designated bus zone or a signposted no parking/stopping area.

Uniform Shop and Term 4 Uniform

The College Uniform Shop opening hours for the holiday period can be found on the College Website at <u>Uniform Shop</u>. Students should return for Term 4 in their Summer uniform. Can I please remind families that the length of dresses and skirts should be worn to the knee. There is also the option for girls to wear shorts for Terms 1 and 4. As your student may have experienced a growth spurt over Winter, I would encourage families to check their Summer uniforms

early in the holiday break to enable replacement uniforms to be purchased prior to the return to school.

During the holiday period from **Monday 30 September – Friday 11 October**, Reception will be staffed from 9.00am – 4.00pm Monday to Friday, other than Public Holidays. If you leave messages for Teachers by email or phone, please be aware that these may not be attended to until school resumes on **Monday 14 October** at 8.45am.

The College respects this legislative right of our staff to disconnect to maintain their work-life balance and their overall wellbeing. Families and students may therefore find that staff may choose not to respond to email or communications outside of their work hours, that is, after 5pm and before 8am on weekdays, and not at all on a weekend or during school holidays.

A Focus on Meaningful Self-Care for Better Wellbeing and Mental Health

It has no doubt been a very busy Term 3 for all of our Daramalan students, staff and families. With many academic and co-curricular activities occurring, many are looking forward to some recharge time during the upcoming term break. For others, a break from school can present its own challenges with the changes to routines, time spent with friends, etc.

The Counselling Team would like to recommend this 'toolkit' article from Lifeline about the importance of selfcare and how to find meaningful self-care opportunities. Whether you undertake these individually, with a group of friends, with your family or with other trusted people, we encourage each member of our Daramalan family to explore how to cultivate and engage in more self-care over the next few weeks.

Self-care for mental health and wellbeing (article by Lifeline)

What is self-care?

Self-care is the practice of taking care of ourselves so that we can stay physically, mentally and emotionally well.

While we all have different ways of practising self-care. the ultimate goal is to make sure we spend time doing things that:

- Make us feel happy and healthy
- Lower our risk of disease and illness
- Help us manage stress or cope during challenging times
- Allow us to feel physically and psychologically safe
- Promote strong social connections.

Sometimes, self-care activities don't require much thought - like brushing our teeth or having a coffee with a friend.

But other self-activities are more deliberate - like taking time away from technology, journaling our thoughts and feelings, or booking an appointment with a therapist.

Ultimately, a self-care activity is something that fills our 'wellbeing cup' instead of emptying it.

Why is self-care important?

An easy way to understand the importance of self-care is to think of yourself as a laptop computer. It doesn't matter if you spend the entire day using it to study for exams, play a game, or host a video conference for work, at some point, you're going to have to recharge the battery.

But of course, we can't just plug ourselves into a power point ...

Instead, we recharge by:

- Sleeping enough
- Eating well
- Moving our bodies
- Connecting with people
- Doing activities we enjoy.

These five areas (sleep, nutrition, movement, connection

and fun) are proven to have huge impacts on our mental health and wellbeing, which is why being proactive about your self-care can be so beneficial.

Benefits of self-care

On top of making sure our basic needs are being met, self-care helps us stay focused on the things that matter to us, establish personal and professional boundaries, and find support when something challenging comes up.

Self-care can:

- Enable us to build strong social connections and form healthy relationships
- Prevent burnout by encouraging us to get enough quality sleep and adopt sustainable work/study/ volunteer habits
- Help us manage people and situations that may make us feel stressed and overwhelmed
- Give us ways to manage the symptoms of mental health conditions like <u>anxiety</u>, <u>depression</u> and <u>trauma</u>
- Give us ways to cope and adapt when facing challenges like <u>relationship problems</u>, <u>financial stress</u>, <u>grief</u> or an <u>extreme weather event</u>.

Making time for self-care can be difficult, especially when you're working full-time, studying or raising a family (or doing all those things at once!).

It can also be difficult to make self-care a priority if you don't feel like you deserve it or it won't make a difference. Feeling unworthy, undeserving, or hopeless can sometimes be signs of low-self-esteem. If this sounds like you, please know that everyone deserves time and space to practise self-care.

Remember - self-care isn't selfish.

We know self-care is important for good mental health and wellbeing, which is why you never need to feel guilty about making it a priority.

With that being said, when you're <u>stressed</u>, <u>depressed</u>, or just feeling a bit flat, it can be difficult to find the energy to even think of how you can practise self-care.

Having a pre-prepared self-care plan, like a <u>self-care box</u>, can be helpful when moments like these hit unexpectedly. This is because it removes the pressure of needing to think about what to do during tough times.

Finding the right self-care for you Even though a self-care activity like cuddling puppies might be something a lot of people would enjoy, it's likely that what fills your cup won't fill someone else's.

And contrary to what someone on social media might tell you, self-care doesn't have to involve expensive moisturiser, a remedial massage, or an expensive gym membership. In fact, it doesn't have to cost a thing

Here are some examples of self-care choices you can make that are free:

- Saying no to a late night out
- Taking time to cook a nice meal
- Going for a walk before work
- Calling a friend for a chat
- Playing board games.

It's important to point out that when we're really struggling, sometimes the only self-care we can practise is literally just making it out of the house to get some sunshine, and that's okay.

Even the smallest amount of self-care can be beneficial.

Lyons House Day

Lyons House is very pleased to announce that we have raised \$1465 for Marymead CatholicCare. Lyons students and staff held a Bake Sale where many of our students participated by baking delicious treats. For example, one of our Year 7's made donuts with her grandmother and they were extremely successful.

Also, during the Bake Sale we had on our winter woollies for the State of Origin games. Many students and teachers participated by wearing their blues or maroons scarves or beanies and made a gold coin donation.

Marymead CatholicCare, the charity our House supports, provides many services, including mental health support, disability services, aged care and homelessness services. Marymead CatholicCare homelessness services provide accommodation for both men and women over 18 years of age. Residents in these homes can stay for 3 months, and the rooms are fully furnished.

Lyons House is delighted to raise money for Marymead CatholicCare, because it is actively supporting homeless

individuals and families in the ACT and region. We are so glad we can raise money for these adults and their children at Mackillop House and MINOSA House. Our funds go towards upgrading homes to make them more comfortable and help them get back on their feet.

Sr Noelene Quinane from Marymead CatholicCare spoke to us at our House assembly, and she shared with us what it means to be part of such a valued community. Sr Quinane gave us insights into how our fundraising would help so many people. I am sure many of us took away a lot of valuable information. One of the key things I took away was that the money we raise really does make a difference, to Marymead CatholicCare and the people they are helping in our community. It also showed us that fundraising should be a key part of our life. If we had no not-for-profit organisations like Marymead CatholicCare, there would be so many things that wouldn't be done, so many people that wouldn't be able to access the support and help they need.

The event kicked off with students setting up their bedding areas, a hands-on introduction to the realities many people face daily. The atmosphere was lively as everyone gathered for a sausage sizzle, fostering camaraderie and a sense of community before the more serious discussions began.

Teah, a representative from Vinnies, delivered an enlightening presentation that opened the students' eyes to the complexities of homelessness. She highlighted various types and causes of homelessness, tailoring her message to resonate with the youth and emphasising the urgency of the issue in our local community. The insights shared during her talk prompted thoughtful conversations among students, prompting many to reflect on their own roles in addressing these challenges.

Georgina Geary (Year 11) aptly summed up the experience, stating, "Immersion activities like this help us to understand what life must be like for people living rough and help us empathise more with their situation. This allows us to develop a passion for service work and be positive members of our society". Her words encapsulated the event's essence, showcasing how experiential learning can lead to genuine empathy and a desire to serve others.

As night fell, the students experienced sleeping outdoors, a stark contrast to their usual comforts. This firsthand experience allowed them to connect with the hardships faced by those without stable housing. Conversations sparked under the stars and a conclusion discussion led by **Ms Alyce Packer** revealed a growing awareness and commitment among the participants to engage in community service and advocacy.

A massive congratulations is in order for **Cushla Donovan** (Social Justice Captain), whose dedication and vision made this event a reality. The Sleepout successfully raised awareness of homelessness and inspired a new generation to take action.

A heartfelt thank you is also extended to the staff members who volunteered their Friday night and Saturday morning, including Ms Jodie Hardiman, Mr Ben McGee, Ms Waka Burridge, Mr Nic Whatman, Mr James Keeley, Ms Eliza Nowlan, Ms, Ellen Canfield, Mr David Kerr, Mr Shaun Warren, Ms Gail Mutton, Ms Sophie Coutts and Ms Alyce Packer. Their support and guidance were instrumental in creating a safe and impactful experience for the students.

In summary, the 2024 St Vincent's Sleepout was not just an event, it was a transformative experience that fostered empathy, awareness, and a sense of responsibility towards our community. As we move forward, let's hope that the insights gained will inspire ongoing conversations and actions aimed at alleviating homelessness in our community.









Business & Government

Year 10 Students Dive into Democracy at AEC and Parliament House

Year 10 students from **Ms Bianca Ross** and **Ms Eve Fitzpatrick's** two Law, Politics and Society classes recently enjoyed an immersive day exploring Australian democracy. Their visit began with interactive information sessions and electoral simulations at the Australian Electoral Commission, where they re-enacted voting and election processes for both the Senate and House of Representatives. They got an insight into some of the most important processes for upholding democracy in Australia and learned valuable skills for when they reach voting age in a few short years.

The day continued with a tour of Parliament House,

offering students a behind-the-scenes look at Australia's legislative processes. They explored key areas, including both houses of Parliament, and learned about the significance of political and legislative decisions.

The day allowed students to see how the processes and concepts they have been learning about in class take shape in the real world, and spend valuable time together as a cohort.





UN Youth Evatt Competition

The United Nations Youth Evatt Competition provides students with an opportunity to engage with current issues, developing their public speaking and negotiation skills whilst participating in a mock United Nations Security Council Debate. Geography

Exploring Biomes: Geography Students Discover Adaptations at the Zoo and Botanical Gardens

Years 9-10 Geography students recently visited the Zoo and Botanical Gardens as part of their study on biomes and food security. The field trip allowed students to observe firsthand how plants and animals have evolved to thrive in various climates. At the Zoo, students explored different habitats, observing the specific adaptations that enable animals to survive in their natural environments, such as the long claws of the Sun Bear for climbing trees or the hypersensitive fingertips of the otter. Students also had the chance to feed various animals and, for the brave among them, hold a snake.

The visit to the Botanical Gardens complemented this by showcasing diverse plant species, each uniquely adapted to different climatic conditions. Students compared the vibrant green, large leaves of rainforest species, designed to capture maximum sunlight and cope with excess water, with the small, spiny desert plants adapted to conserve moisture. This hands-on learning experience provided students with a deeper understanding of how living organisms interact with their environment, reinforcing key classroom concepts.

Science

Year 8 Science

In Year 8 Science, students are getting hands-on with chemistry by using lollies and LEGO to model how elements mix to create new substances. It's like the sweetest science experiment ever, where you learn that a tasty treat can represent elemental bonding. Who knew building molecules could be so much fun—and delicious? It's a bit like playing with your food, but with a side of scientific discovery.

Year 9 Science

In Year 9 Science, students dived into the albedo effect as part of their Earth Systems unit, exploring how different colours absorb or reflect heat. They discovered that choosing a paint colour for your house could be the difference between a cozy Winter and an oven-like Summer. So, if they start offering colour advice for your next paint job, remember—they've got the science to back it up!

Students took on the challenge of hydroelectric power by using models to explore the relationship between gravitational and potential energy. As they built and tested their models, they collected valuable data to analyse, sharpening their science investigation skills along the way. The hands-on experience helped them see how energy can be harnessed and transformed - by the end, they were generating more ideas than a hydro dam produces electricity!







Year 11 Chemistry

Our Year 11 Chemistry students have been feeling the pressure..... gas pressure that is! Our chemists have used air pressure to move an egg into a bottle without touching it - is it magic? No – it's chemistry!



Year 11 Biology

An investigation into how temperature affects cell membranes – unbeetable! Students used beetroot discs exposed to different temperatures to see what happens when things get a bit too hot. The results were colourful – showing that higher temperatures will cause more pigment to leak out.

Year 12 Earth and Environmental Science students kicked off National Science Week by attending Natural Disasters Day at Geoscience Australia.

Bushfires, floods, earthquakes, tsunamis and volcanoes are some of the major natural hazards causing loss of life and significant damage to property and infrastructure.

After presentations from a range of Geoscientists and Engineers on their research areas including geomagnetic storms, flood vulnerability and hotspots, we split off into groups for activities.

Students entered the 3D theatre looking at the elevation model of Earth showing plate tectonic movement and the distribution of earthquakes, their depth, and volcanoes. They spoke to earthquake experts and had a tour of a



seismic test facility. After a short break for pizza and hot dogs, we then got to go on a behind-the-scenes look at Australia's National Earthquake Centre, where seismic waves and tsunamis are monitored 24-hours a day from within Australia and across the world.

Students also got to experience what it is like in a 'Situation Room', where politicians, scientists and emergency managers and workers come together to problem solve and plan for how to mitigate future or current hazards and disasters occurring.

Year 12 Chemistry

Our Year 12 chemists are learning about organic molecules using model kits. They are looking at how they are used in industrial processes and ways to make chemistry more environmentally friendly. The students were so productive they decided to have some fun and create a monster molecule!



Science Week

Every week is Science Week in our Dempsey building – but the official Science Week has also been celebrated. It was an absolute blast, especially with the return of the senior students, eager to defend their title in the ultimate timed Escape Room challenge. They raced against the clock, solving intricate puzzles and navigating through hands-on stations to piece together the secret winning code.

Elemental – The Year 9 Dance Class at Floriade This year, Floriade celebrated its 37th anniversary with the theme "Art in Bloom." On Monday 16 September Ms Jessica Haynes' Year 9 Dance class delivered an inspiring performance on Stage 88, created by the students. Our piece, titled "Elemental," tells the story of a flower's growth and how the elements contribute to its development. 



A further 18 students joined us for another fantastic day of Skiing and Boarding, with the mountains truly giving us a taste of four seasons in one day.


