From the Principal



Dear Parents/ Carers, Staff and Students.

A very belated welcome back to Term 2, given that we are already at the end of the third week of term. As I mentioned in my Daranews article

at the end of last term, Term 1 certainly was a whirlwind of activities and events, and if the past three weeks are any indication, I am sure that Term 2 will bring a similar level of activity around the College. We are, however, also heading back into cold and flu season especially now that the weather has started to turn. As there are many members of our extended community who are vulnerable and immunocompromised, I would urge families to keep students at home when they have been experiencing colds and flu to enable us to keep our community as healthy as possible.

Since my last Daranews article we have mourned the passing of Pope Francis, watched with anticipation the Conclave of the Cardinals as they prayed and discerned to elect his successor, and celebrated the announcement last week that Cardinal Robert Prevost had been elected as the 267th pontiff and would be known as Pope Leo XIV. As a community we have prayed and reflected upon the legacy of Pope Francis' papacy, described by Cardinal Re as "a pope among the people, with an open heart towards everyone".

Next week we will be hosting the Annual General Meeting of the four Australian MSC schools, as we do each year in May. These meetings provide an excellent opportunity for key representatives from the Provincial Office including the MSC Provincial Superior, Fr Stephen Hackett MSC, the MSC Education Members Council, the Chevalier Institute, and the Board Chairs, Principals, Business Managers and Assistant Principals Mission from the four schools, to come together over three days for a range of meetings.

From the Principal

ANZAC Ceremony and Sports Assembly

We have been able to gather as a community twice already this term. The focus of our opening assembly was our ANZAC commemoration service. The second occasion was to celebrate and acknowledge the achievements of our students at each of the three sports carnivals held last term. The next opportunity for us to all be together will be for Sacred Heart Day on Friday 6 June.

Through the theme of 'Service' for our ANZAC Ceremony, we were able to acknowledge the life-long service and dedication to others of Pope Francis. We were joined by Corporal Dion Caskey from the Federation Guard who shared with us the significance of ANZAC Day and the first ANZACs for current service men and women. Our students who are members of Cadet Units from the Air Force, Army and Navy, were once again key contributors to the ceremony. I would like to acknowledge and thank Ms Cheryl Hamill who prepared the ceremony before she departed for her new position in the NT and Ms Angela Dunn who stepped in at the beginning of the term to oversee proceedings. I would like to congratulate our College Leaders who facilitated and led the ceremony, Year 12 student Lachlan Hynd who performed a poignant and moving live rendition of the Last Post, and Year 11 student **Ruby Holden** who led the College in the National Anthem, as she had done at the Queanbeyan Dawn Service on ANZAC Day.

Last Friday, we gathered for a second time as a whole community, this time to celebrate and acknowledge the achievements of our students at the three sports carnivals held in Term 1: Swimming, Athletics and Cross Country. The assembly also provided our College Leaders the opportunity to outline the achievements, successes and activities within each of their portfolio areas and how students can become involved throughout the term and year ahead. As I mentioned when I spoke to the students, I am constantly amazed at the activities and co-curricular activities that are available to our students on a daily basis. There is certainly something for everyone, and I urged all students to check the Daily News and become involved.

At the end of the Assembly, I was able to acknowledge and present seven students, some of whom have already been mentioned previously in Daranews, with Principal's Awards for their Australian representation:

Charlie Ravouvou (Year 10) who has also been selected as a member of the U17 Emerging American Football Olympic Squad.

Lily Steinman (Year 12) who recently competed as a member of the Australian team in International Equestrian Vaulting.

Charlotte Seymour (Year 12) who will travel to Brazil in October to compete as an Australian representative at the prestigious Margot Fonteyn Ballet Competition.

Parking and Supporting Student Safety

I would again like to reiterate my previous messaging relating to parking and student safety around the College. Unfortunately, almost every day I witness multiple near misses where students have been dropped off and have alighted from cars in No Stopping areas or have crossed the

busy roads in between buses, cars or not at the designated pedestrian crossings when being picked up. To keep our students safe when making their way to and from school, please ensure you drive and park safely and legally around our school. Unsafe and illegal parking can reduce visibility of our students and motorists to see each other, creating a significant hazard when students cross the road. Please remember not to park across pedestrian crossings, in No Stopping zones, on corners, verges or double parking. Our priority is ensuring the safety of all members of our community on the increasingly busy roads that surround the College.

I would also like to remind our families who attend the College out of hours and on weekends, particularly for sporting and performing arts events, not to park on the nature strips or verges along Morphett and Challis Streets. I have received complaints from our neighbours outlining their concerns regarding footpath access and safety due to illegally parked vehicles. Thank you in advance for your support in ensuring the safety of our community.

The Counsellors Hub

Staying in Control of your Schooling Experience
In a world that often feels overwhelming, one of the most empowering mental health tools is understanding the

empowering mental health tools is understanding the Circle of Control. This concept helps separate the things we can control or influence, and those things we need to let go.

The three main areas of this idea are as follows:

Inner circle (what you can control): In this section, you have your actions, choices, words and responses. The more focus we have here, the more capacity for growth we have.

Middle circle (what you can influence): In this section we have relationships, team dynamics and group decisions. Although you cannot control them, your behaviour can impact them.

Outer circle (what you cannot control): In this section we have other people's choices, the past, the weather and global events. Worrying about this area drains our energy and almost always increases our stress levels.

Why does it matter:

During my time as one of the School Counsellors, I have seen a lot of students spend time trying to control the uncontrollable. This has resulted in them feeling helpless, anxious and frustrated. Focusing on things you can control such as our mindset, the effort we put in and our behaviour, helps us regain a sense of agency, reduces anxiety, improves resilience and promotes mental clarity.

How can we apply this in a school setting:

Naturally, being at school comes with a lot of pressure. Grades, friendships, rules and expectations. That's why understanding and applying the Circle of Control can help students feel more grounded and in control of their schooling experience. Going back to the inner, middle and outer circle examples, here are some of the things that we can control, influence, and let go of.

Control:

- Attitude towards learning
- · Effort on assignments/exams
- Behaviour towards others (kindness, generosity...it is the Year of Hospitality after all!)
- · Asking for help
- How to respond to challenges and feedback from teachers.

Influence:


- · Group assignments
- Relationships
- How you are perceived (think of consistency)
- Learning environment (How clean is your classroom? Do you put your rubbish away? Do you make use of the bins at school?)

No control:

- School rules and policy (put your phone away)
- Family dynamics
- · Other students' behaviour
- Unexpected events (i.e fire alarms)
- Grading decisions made by teachers.

To build your resilience, accountability, and emotional regulation, always ask yourself "How much control do I have of this situation before deciding on how to respond to it. Remember, asking for help is never a bad idea. The Counselling Team has a weekly lunchtime drop-in every Wednesday in the Counselling Hub. Thursday Craft




Featured Author Yuval Noah Harari

Legal Studies Incursion: Judge Elizabeth Morris

We sincerely thank Judge Morris for making time to visit Daramalan during her brief stay in Canberra, as well as Ms Ross and Ms Fitzpatrick for organising this opportunity.

MUNA Qualification

Year 7 Languages Zoo Excursion

On Wednesday 14 and Friday 16 May, the Year 7 Languages classes went on an excursion to the National Zoo and Aquarium. After a short bus ride, we arrived at the zoo and were split up into groups and our adventure began. During our visit, students had a booklet to learn about animal habitats, where they are from and their life expectancy in the wild and captivity. Some students were lucky enough to see a snow leopard that usually hides very well. We had a lovely sunny day, enjoying a fun and exciting day out at the zoo.





Our class went to Jamala National Zoo and Aquarium with the French and German classes to learn about the animals from each of our chosen languages as well as looking at others from around the world. We were given booklets to fill out about the different animals at the zoo. Some questions in our booklet were asking us what features animals had and how does this help them survive and if we could write as many fun facts as possible about our favourite animal in the language we were learning. We walked past the lions, penguins, otters, bears, monkeys and the extremely cute

meerkats. We all stopped for a recess break at the tables near the rhino enclosure before circling back to visit the aquarium. Everyone took their time walking around the aquarium digging up fossils in the dino room, marvelling at the massive snakes and dipping their hands in the touch pool. My favourite part of the day was definitely seeing the jellyfish in their colour changing tank, it was so pretty. Overall we had an amazing, fun and educational time enjoying looking at the cute animals.

Science

Year 7 - Forces

Our Year 7s have been exploring how these simple machines make our lives easier by changing the magnitude of forces. One of the key concepts they've learned is how a lever, with its fulcrum and lever arm, can amplify a small force to lift a heavier load.

To put their knowledge into action, our budding engineers took on the challenge of building their very own catapults. Using their understanding of forces and levers, they designed and constructed these ancient machines to launch projectiles.





Year 10 - Motion

In Year 10 Science, students use ticker timers to analyse motion. By examining the dots left on the tape, they can interpret the object's movement over time. The spacing of the dots tells a story: evenly spaced dots indicate constant speed, while increasing or decreasing distances between dots suggest acceleration or deceleration. When it comes to learning about motion, our students aren't afraid to "speed" ahead!



Biology - Exploring Bass Point: A Hands-On Science Adventure

Last term, our students embarked on an exciting field trip to Bass Point, NSW, where they conducted a quadrat study to gather both abiotic and biotic data. This hands-on experience allowed them to delve into the fascinating world of intertidal zones, examining the intricate relationships between environmental factors and the distribution and abundance of various organisms.

Throughout the day, students meticulously recorded data on abiotic factors such as temperature and salinity. They also observed and catalogued the diverse range of biotic components, including sea slugs, anemones, and even an octopus! By analysing this data, students aim to uncover patterns and correlations that will deepen their understanding of how abiotic factors influence the ecosystems within intertidal zones.

The highlight of the day was undoubtedly the exploration of the rock pools. Students eagerly searched for marine animals, experiencing the thrill of discovering sea slugs and anemones up close. This hands-on collection not only enriched their scientific knowledge but also fostered a greater appreciation for marine life and the delicate balance of these ecosystems.

I'm "shore" we all had a great day at the beach!









Science Cont...

Chemistry

Our Year 11 chemists are learning about chemical reactions and reacting quantities. This experiment demonstrated the concept of limiting reagents with an all-time classic combination of bicarb soda and vinegar. The carbon dioxide gas was collected in ballons, and the students compared the sizes of the balloons to determine the limiting reagent.

Our Year 12 chemists are completing individual investigations using the volumetric analysis technique of titrations. Students chose their own topic, and these ranged from ocean acidification levels, Vitamin C and acid content in fruit juices, supplements and wine and the effectiveness of antacid treatments.





RACI Titration Competition

The annual RACI Titration Competition involves senior Chemistry students from across ACT competing against each other to accurately conduct titrations and calculate concentrations of unknown solutions. This year, the competition occurred after school on Tuesday 6 May at the Australian National University. We had one team of Chemistry students represent Daramalan College. These students were **Sebastian Abbondante**, **Samantha Crispe** (Year 12) and **Tristian Tierney** (Year 11).

Through participating in this challenging competition, these students demonstrated high levels of Chemistry knowledge and practical skills. They also demonstrated great teamwork and managed their time effectively to

complete all sections of the competition. As always, we ended the evening by sharing some pizza and celebrating the excellent results from all students!



Questacon Program

Congratulations to **Samantha Crispe** and **Sebastian Abbondante** – both have been accepted into the Questacon Student Training Program. The Program offers College students a unique opportunity to gain hands-on experience in science communication and customer service. Participants develop valuable skills in public speaking and engaging with diverse audiences, which can enhance their future academic and career prospects.

Science Club

We are off to a flying start in Term 2 by investigating different paper airplane designs! Students made planes that zigged and zagged, twisted and turned, and fired through the air like a bullet. This built off the fun students had in Term 1 making lava lamps, performing party tricks with balloons, and creating elephant toothpaste. 




Year 11 Photography - Light Painting


Year 11 Photography have been experimenting with long exposure 'light painting'.




