From the Principal



Dear Parents/ Carers, Staff and Students,

The end of the semester has come upon many of us very quickly, though I am sure for others it may not have come soon enough, especially

given the cold snap of the past few weeks! It has been another whirlwind of a term filled with events, activities and opportunities for authentic and rich learning experiences, all combined with several long weekends which has meant that we have come to the end of the semester in a blink of an eye. I would like to thank and acknowledge the staff who have provided these opportunities for our students from their preparation of our assemblies, productions and performances, Sacred Heart Day, organisation of overnight camps and excursions, reflection days and retreats, through to our senior examinations. The past few weeks have been busy ones

filled with a focus on assessment and exams for our students and marking and finalising progressive feedback and reporting for our staff. Today is the Feast of the Sacred Heart. A very special day not only for our College but the wider Catholic and MSC communities here in Australia and around the world. The founder of the MSC, Fr Jules Chevalier was totally committed to the cause of Jesus, whom he called "the Sacred Heart". He devoted himself without reserve to the spreading of the Devotion to the Sacred Heart, so that Jesus, the Sacred Heart, would be known and loved, everywhere. We celebrated and acknowledged Sacred Heart Day on Friday 6 June prior to our senior students commencing their exams. On Friday 13 June, I had the privilege to travel to Chevalier College in Bowral with three of our College Leaders, Tayla Holt, Natalie Gordon and Ruby Gifford, to join their Sacred Heart Day celebrations. Our Leaders spent time over lunch speaking with Br John Walker MSC who is one of the MSCs who had lived onsite at the College in the MSC Residence until 2019. Fr Gerard McCormick MSC, whom some of our community may know from his time at the Charnwood Parish, provided the Leaders with a tour and his personal insights into the importance of Douglas Park to him as an MSC. The students spent time in the cemetery where a large number of MSC priests and brothers are buried, finding the connections with those MSC who made significant contributions to our history.

We were delighted to begin this week being joined by over 200 grandparents, parents and other significant people in the lives of our Year 7 students for our annual Grandparents Day. The day comprised of a Liturgy of the Word which included reflections and prayers from our Year 7 students before touring the College and sharing light refreshments. Our visitors were also treated to a performance from our award-winning Junior Concert Band. Amongst our guests were a number of former

students whose grandchildren now attend the College, along with those whose children attended Daramalan or who have been members of our staff. It was wonderful to be able to welcome so many visitors and to watch our Year 7 students proudly showing their grandparents their school. I would like to thank and acknowledge **Ms Angela Dunn, Mr Michael Jackson, Ms Yvonne Turnbull, Ms Heather Chapman**, the Year 7 RE Teachers, the College Maintenance Team, and of course our Junior Concert Band, the Year 9 students who stepped in to assist and our Year 7 students, for their respective roles in making this such a special day.

This term the College's major charity focus has been the St Vincent de Paul Winter Appeal. The response from families to this appeal has been wonderful again this year. The generosity of the Daramalan community never ceases to amaze me. I would like to extend my thanks to the Social Justice Group, Mr Ben McGee, our College Captain Social Justice Sophie Neighbour and all involved in the organisation and collection of the donations. 
Staff Professional Learning Week and Holiday Hours

The Truth About Vaping: What Every Student Should Know

Vaping might look cool on TikTok or seem harmless because "it's just vapor", but there's a lot more going on behind that cloud of smoke. As the number of high school students trying vapes continues to rise, it's time we ask: do we really know what we're breathing in?

What is Vaping?

Vaping is the act of inhaling an aerosol produced by an electronic device—commonly called a vape, e-cigarette or vape pen. These devices heat up a liquid (called e-liquid or vape juice), turning it into an aerosol that users inhale into their lungs.

The liquid usually contains:

- Nicotine the same highly addictive substance found in cigarettes.
- Flavourings like fruit, mint or candy (which can make it more appealing to young people).
- Chemicals some of which can be toxic to the lungs and body.

Even products that claim to be "nicotine-free" may still contain nicotine or harmful substances. And while they might seem cleaner than traditional cigarettes, vaping devices aren't harmless—especially for developing teen brains and bodies.

Why it Matters: What the Numbers Say

Recent Australian research has shown vaping is far from harmless:

- A 2023 report from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) found that 1 in 6 teenagers aged 14 - 17 have tried vaping, with numbers rising sharply over the last few years.
- Among current teenage users, most reported vaping regularly, not just trying it once.
- The Cancer Council has warned that young people who vape are three times more likely to take up smoking traditional cigarettes.
- Studies have also linked vaping with increased anxiety, poor sleep and concentration issues in school-aged teens.

What's more concerning is that many students don't know what's in their vape. Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) audit in 2023 found that over 90% of vapes sold in Australia illegally contained nicotine, even when labelled otherwise.

Why Do Teens Vape?

Many students say they started vaping because of:

- Peer pressure
- Curiosity
- Flavoured products (like mango, mint or cotton candy)
- · Stress relief

But what starts as an experiment or a social habit can quickly become a serious addiction.

The Risks You Shouldn't Ignore

Even if it seems like "no big deal", vaping can seriously affect your health:

- Nicotine addiction: Most vapes contain nicotine, which can rewire your developing brain and make it harder to focus, learn or control emotions.
- Lung damage: Some users have ended up in hospital with vaping-related lung injuries.
- Mental health impact: Studies show links between nicotine use and anxiety, depression and mood swings.
- Unknown long-term effects: Vaping is still relatively new, and scientists are still learning about the longterm health risks.

What You Can Do

If you or someone you know is vaping and wants to stop, you're not alone. There are resources and people ready to help:

- Talk to a school counsellor, teacher or trusted adult.
- Use quitting apps like "My QuitBuddy" or call Quitline (13 78 48).
- Support each other quitting is easier when you're not doing it alone.

Final Thoughts

It's easy to fall into the trap of thinking vaping is harmless. But your health - and your future - is worth more than a buzz. Whether you've vaped before or never touched one, staying informed is the first step in making smart choices.

Religious Education

Old Bibles on Loan to Daramalan College

Year 7 and 8 Religious Education students had the privilege of viewing some very old bibles that were borrowed from St Mark's National Theological Library and the Theology Department of Charles Sturt University.

First, we looked at a Latin Bible (Vulgate) which showed the influence of the Roman Empire on the Church. Even though the language of trade was Greek; official documents were written in Latin. Moving to England we saw an image of the Saxon Bible which was a Latin translation with some Saxon words added to make it more understandable. We discussed the Tyndale Bible and the risks people took to make the Bible accessible to people in England.

Students were then shown the Geneva Bible (1633) which had a Book of Common Prayer bound into the front, followed by a Polyglot Bible (1602) which had German and Latin on one page and Greek and Hebrew on the opposite. We viewed a copy of the King James Version that had obviously been taken great care of, with family signatures in the front dating back to 1755 and several generations added later, plus a Scottish Book of Common Prayer from 1633.

Then to Australia. We saw a bible that was one of many issued to convicts. We heard that convicts did not always cherish their bibles as much as the family heirloom bibles elsewhere. Later we saw a Dutch Bible. We heard a Boer War story of a wounded Afrikaner fighter who gave his precious (and big and heavy) bible to an enemy Australian soldier so that it could be preserved. That soldier kept the bible for some years before donating it in 1911. There was also a 1906 miniature bible that women would carry in their glove. We also saw bibles given to Diggers in the two World Wars and a current print version. Finally, we saw some bibles written in Indigenous languages along with some artwork of biblical stories made by Indigenous people – one with an MSC connection.

We are grateful to CSU for sharing these precious books and giving our students a deeper appreciation of our history.


Year 7s Heat Shield

Year 7 students took on a red-hot space engineering challenge, designing heat shields to protect a very important cargo — a chocolate "space probe"! The goal was to prevent the chocolate from melting under intense heat, simulating the extreme conditions of atmospheric entry. Using creative materials and teamwork, students put their designs to the test in a fiery trial of science and engineering. It was a heated competition, but their coolheaded problem solving really stole the spotlight!









Year 8s Have a Ball with Physics!

Our Year 8 students have been bouncing with excitement as they explored the science behind bouncing balls. In a hands-on experiment, they investigated why some balls bounce higher than others, learning about energy transfer, efficiency, and how different materials affect performance. It was a high-impact lesson in potential and kinetic energy, with students discovering that not all energy makes it back into the bounce - some is lost as heat or sound.













Year 9

Year 9 students are really balancing their way through science this term as they explore homeostasis—how the body keeps things like water and glucose levels just right. They have also been learning about disease and immunity, discovering how our immune system protects us like tiny superheroes. It's an exciting topic that shows just how clever our bodies are at keeping everything in check.

Year 10s Tackle Science with Skills, Smarts and STEM! To finish off the term, our Year 10 students have been sharpening their science skills across a wide range of

activities. From interpreting real-world data on disease trends, to understanding the digital footprint we leave behind, students have been learning how science connects to everyday life. They loved the classic egg drop challenge—designing and building structures to protect an egg from a high fall - combining creativity with physics and engineering know-how was very eggciting! Students have also competed in science-themed escape rooms, where teamwork and problem-solving were key to cracking codes and escaping in time.















ICAS and ICQ

Exciting opportunities are coming up for students to challenge themselves in science through the ICAS Science competition and the International Chemistry Quiz. These respected external competitions allow students to apply their knowledge, think critically and gain recognition for their science skills. After our highly successful production of Romeo and Juliet in May, Daramalan Theatre Company is now full steam ahead for some great performances of three new works.


