From the Principal

From the Principal

While it is a busy time, it is important that students maintain a good balance in their lives to reduce anxiety about meeting the deadlines associated with the inevitable assessment that comes at this time of the semester. For many students who have planned their work and time well, they will find their efforts have paid off in terms of being well-placed to meet all deadlines successfully. We wish our Senior students all the best when their formal examination period begins in the coming weeks.

MSC Visit, Fr Jim Littleton MSC and Sacred Heart Day

As I mentioned in the last edition of Daranews, for several days in Week 14 we hosted a large number of guests from the three other MSC schools in Australia as well as the MSC Provincial Superior and other members of the Provincial's Leadership team and the MSC Education Members Council. The meetings which were held over two full days provided a great opportunity for representatives from each of the Colleges, MSC Education and the Chevalier Institute to discuss issues and share ideas.

Last Wednesday a large number of our staff travelled to Kensington and then to Douglas Park to attend the funeral service for **Fr Jim Littleton MSC** following his passing at the age of 96 on Wednesday 6 May. Fr Jim was Principal of Daramalan from 1971 to 1979 and returned to Daramalan where he lived onsite at the MSC residence from 1998 until 2019 when the residence was closed. Throughout these years, Fr Jim was not simply a leader of our College, he was an integral part of the daily life of Daramalan. In his role as Chaplain, Fr Jim continued to accompany staff and students in learning about the MSC charism, celebrating Mass, and he was a frequent visitor at staff morning tea where he would share stories and offer his wisdom. Fr Jim was also the Principal of Downlands College in Toowoomba, where he had been a student, Chevalier College in Bowral, was the first Director of MSC Education, and had also held the role of Provincial Superior. Fr Jim was a prolific writer and historian publishing many books throughout his life. We anticipate that a memorial service will be held here at the College on Saturday 4 July to celebrate Fr Jim's life and contribution to Daramalan and the wider MSC community.

Next Friday we will be celebrating Sacred Heart Day with a Mass led by **Fr Bob Irwin MSC** and concelebrated by our Chaplain, **Fr Tru Nguyen MSC**, taking our annual Heart Photo, sharing a BBQ lunch and then being wowed by our amazing performers in the afternoon at Dara's Got Talent. Thank you in advance to those families who have volunteered to help with the cooking of our House BBQs. I am sure that it will be a wonderful day of celebration of our charism and who we are as an MSC school.

Parking, Blocking Driveway Access, No Stopping Zones and Supporting Student Safety

I would again like to reiterate my previous messaging relating to parking and student safety around the College. Unfortunately, almost every day I witness multiple near misses where students have been dropped off and have alighted from cars in No Stopping areas or have crossed the busy roads in between buses, cars or not at the designated pedestrian crossings when being picked up. To keep our students safe when making their way to and from school, please ensure you drive and park safely and legally around our school. Unsafe and illegal parking can reduce visibility of our students and motorists to see each other, creating a significant hazard when students cross the road. Please remember not to park across pedestrian crossings, in No Stopping zones, on corners, verges or double parking. Our priority is ensuring the safety of all members of our community on the increasingly busy roads that surround the College. I would also ask that when collecting students of an afternoon that families do not park in the College driveways or the nature strip on Morphett Street once the gates have been closed. This creates a significant safety hazard for our students.

I would also like to remind our families who attend the College out of hours and on weekends, particularly for sporting events, not to park on the nature strips or verges along Morphett and Challis Streets. I have received complaints from our neighbours outlining their concerns regarding footpath access and safety due to illegally parked vehicles. Thank you in advance for your support in ensuring the safety of our community.

From the Principal

2027 Enrolments and Year 11 Transition Information

The official enrolment period for Year 7 and new Year 11 families for 2027 officially close today, Friday 29 May. Once again, this year we have received a significant number of applications for places in Year 7, 2027. Our enrolment policy provides a clear guide as to the process that we follow when determining the offers of places. Offers of places are scheduled to be made, in line with those made for other ACT Catholic Secondary Schools, by the end of this Term. Families with students currently enrolled in Year 10 are reminded that the Notice of Intention forms for Year 11 2027, emailed to families earlier this term, are due to be returned by **Friday 12 June**.

Uniform

As the weather has turned colder and the foggy and damp mornings have become more frequent, can I take this opportunity to remind families that hoodies, including Daramalan sports hoodies and quarter zip jumpers, and 'puffer' jackets do not form part of the Daramalan uniform and should not be worn to school, at school or from school. Unfortunately, we are seeing these items creeping in as the weather has changed. There is the option for our female students to wear trousers during the Winter months to alleviate the cold associated with wearing a skirt in the Canberra Winter. Thank you for your support in ensuring that our students wear their uniform with pride as ambassadors of the College.

Student Leave Requests

A reminder for families that should a student need to be away for 5 or more school days for reasons other than sickness, prior approval from the Principal must be sought in writing via a letter or an email. This includes where a student is absent due to their participation in representative sporting teams and competitions. The request needs to be

submitted in sufficient time so that arrangements regarding missed schoolwork and assessment can be made. The preferred email address for such requests is principal@daramalan.act.edu.au.

Students in Years 11 and 12 should be aware that there are strict requirements for attendance stipulated by the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies in order for students to gain credit for a unit of work. Any extended absences from school may have an impact on the student's ability to be assessed even if all the assessment tasks for the unit are completed. Students should seek advice from the Assistant Principal - Curriculum Years 11-12, Mr Steve Carroll, prior to making plans to miss any school days.

Scholarship Fund

Application forms for Scholarships for the 2027 school year will be available on the College website early next term and will be located under Enrolments/Scholarships. Daramalan Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need rather than on academic, sporting or cultural excellence. Their purpose is to provide the opportunity for students to attend Daramalan who may not otherwise have the opportunity due to financial hardship. Access Canberra is currently conducting a Working with Vulnerable People (WWVP) compliance audit across selected activities in the ACT, and the College has been selected for inspection.

As part of this process, in-person checks may occur at trainings, games and other College activities to verify that all individuals engaged in regulated activities hold a valid WWVP registration.

A reminder to all volunteers that you must carry your WWVP card with you when undertaking any regulated activity on behalf of the College. This includes roles such as coaching or assisting sports teams, team management, refereeing or officiating, and any activity involving direct work with students.

We appreciate your support in ensuring we meet our compliance obligations and continue to provide a safe environment for all students.

Please be aware of the College's terms regarding unpaid fees:

- An administration fee of \$15.00 (including GST) will be charged to any family account not paid by the due date (typically 14 days after the start of term).
- A further \$15 fee will be added each fortnight until the account is fully paid.
- These charges do not apply if the College has agreed to a payment plan and fees are being paid by direct debit.
- The administration fee covers the additional costs incurred due to late payment.
- If a parent defaults on fee payment, they may also be liable for all associated recovery costs, including legal and collection fees.

ACT Pre Learner Licence Course - Semester 2, 2026

Registration for the ACT Pre Learner Licence Course Road Readiness program opens **Monday 8 June**.

Did you know that the ACT Government has a requirement that all ACT residents must complete a Pre Learner Licence Course if they want to obtain an ACT Drivers Licence?

If your child turns 15 years and 9 months before the end of the year and they want to get their ACT Learner Drivers Licence, now is the time for them to complete this compulsory pre learner driver education program. Courses are available through the school for \$70, with up to 3 options for timing available. This is a fraction of the cost compared to completing it through an external provider and with the familiar environment and trained educators on staff, we offer the course in a way that is supportive and suitable for Daramalan College students.

Bookings are only available via Qkr!. Courses for Semester 2 start Week 3 of Term 3, with further information specific to each course option available via Qkr! or from the contact above.

This will be the last time the college will offer the Pre Learner Licence Course for 2026, so if you miss out Semester 2 or are not quite old enough to get your Learners Licence yet, there will be the opportunity to enrol for a course in Semester 1, 2027. National Walk for Truth

On Tuesday 26 May, seven Daramalan students and two teachers participated in the National Walk for Truth. The walk was led by **Travis Lovett**, a Kerrupmara Gunditjmara man and Executive Director of the University of Melbourne's Centre for Truth Telling and Dialogue. The walk began at the Victorian Parliament in Naarm/ Melbourne and travelled to Parliament House in Canberra on Ngunnawal and Ngambri Country. The Daramalan contingent joined the walk from Lyneham to the ANU. Along the walk Travis has carried an Open Letter on a kangaroo skin to give to Prime Minister Anthony Albanese. The letter is asking for national truth telling - for truth to be told, to be listened to and to heal.

This walk was a truly meaningful experience, offering both students and teachers a fantastic opportunity to actively participate in the Reconciliation process. It fostered a deeper understanding and connection, strengthening our commitment to walking together towards unity, respect and truth telling.



The Corroboree Culture Day held at UC provided a meaningful opportunity to both connect to land and learn about Indigenous practises in an exciting and rewarding way. Representatives came to talk about pathways for Indigenous students going forward and offered many activities including athletic events, traditional dancing, and practices like weaving and spear throwing, showing the influence of Indigenous culture. Personally, I learnt

that Indigenous culture is not something that is just observed, but something that must be experienced through storytelling and participating. It was a great way to help people connect and understand the value of cultural traditions.

AFP Crime Scene Investigators Visit Year 11 Legal Studies

Students in **Ms Eve Fitzpatrick's** Year 11 Legal Studies class were treated to an engaging and eye opening incursion this week as Australian Federal Police Crime Scene Investigators **Nat** and **Bek** visited the class to share their expertise as part of the 'Crime and Justice' unit.

The session gave students a rare opportunity to hear directly from professionals working 'on the ground' in criminal investigations. Nat and Bek spoke about their day to day responsibilities, the specialised skills required in forensic work, and the career pathways that led them into the AFP. They also highlighted how police powers, legislation and strict investigative procedures shape every aspect of their roles.

Students were particularly captivated by the investigators' real world stories from the field, which illustrated the complexity and importance of crime scene work. Nat and Bek also discussed what it's like to testify in court, how



they prepare for giving evidence, and how their roles fit into the broader context of the justice system.

It was a fantastic learning experience that sparked plenty of curiosity, and perhaps even inspired a few future forensic investigators!

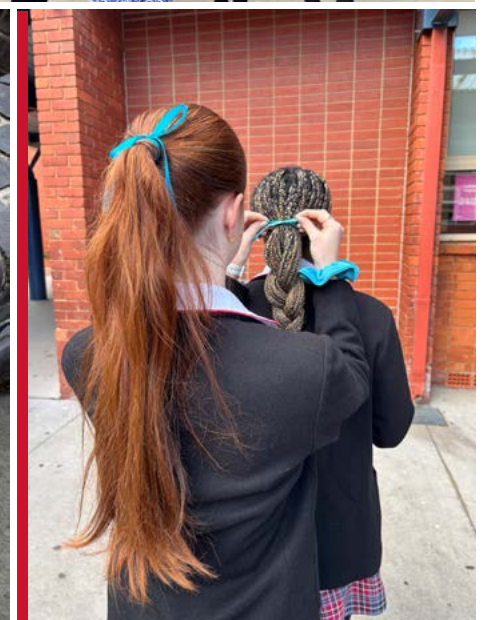
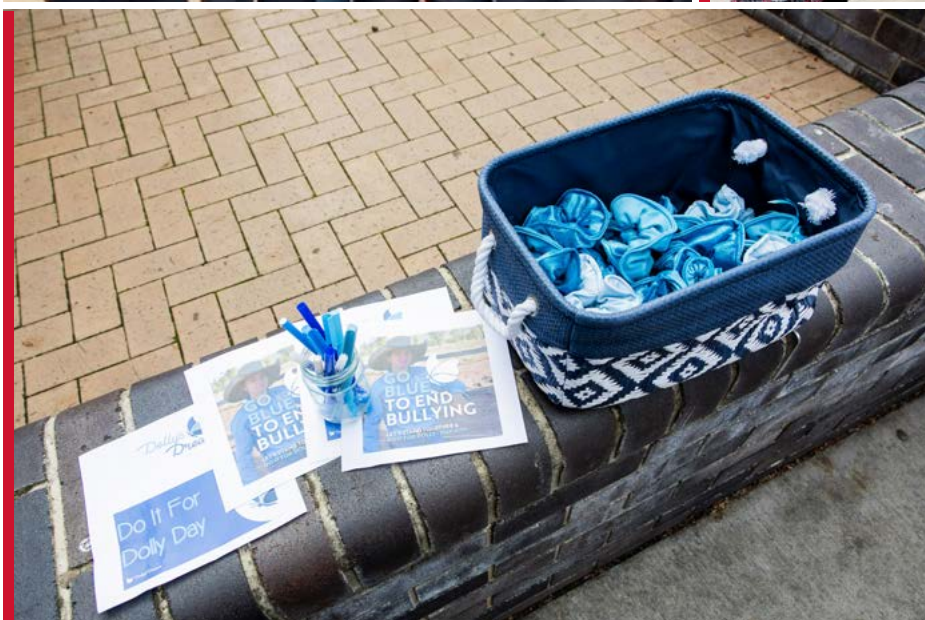
Do it for Dolly Day

Vinnies Winter Appeal

What would they need? Maybe a hoodie, socks, gloves, a beanie, a jacket, a blanket or a sleeping bag? What would they need to eat for a day? Maybe long-life milk, pasta, soup, tinned vegetables, cereal, muesli bars or noodles?

We are inviting all PTs to “give warmth and food to one person” for a day.

From now until late July, we are collecting clothes and food for those doing it tough in Canberra’s winter.

We are seeking warm layers - jackets, jumpers, pants, socks (new), gloves, beanies, blankets and sleeping bags. We are also seeking food - breakfast (cereal, spreads, tinned fruit, tea and coffee), lunch and dinner (rice, pasta, noodles, canned soup, pantry staples, pasta sauce). These lists are by no means exhaustive, all non-perishable food items welcome.

Students are asked to bring their donations into PT. Qkr! is also open for monetary donations that will be used to buy items.

Grounding Techniques to Support Student Wellbeing

Grounding strategies are simple techniques that can help you reconnect with the present moment, regulate strong emotions and feel calmer when stress begins to build.

Grounding does not make difficult emotions disappear, but it can help reduce the intensity of distress and support clearer thinking, problem-solving and emotional regulation. These strategies are commonly used to support people experiencing anxiety, stress, panic, low mood or emotional overwhelm.

Why can grounding be helpful?

When we feel anxious or overwhelmed, our brain can shift into “fight, flight or freeze” mode. This is the body’s natural stress response system and can lead to physical symptoms such as racing thoughts, rapid breathing, nausea, muscle tension or feeling disconnected from what is happening around us.

During these times, grounding techniques can help slow the nervous system down and bring attention back to the here and now.

Grounding techniques can be particularly helpful:

- Before exams, presentations or sporting events
- During periods of stress or overthinking
- When emotions feel intense or difficult to manage
- During moments of panic or anxiety
- When finding it difficult to focus or concentrate
- After conflict or upsetting situations.

What are some grounding strategies young people can try?

Different strategies work for different people, so it can be helpful to experiment and practise skills when calm, rather than waiting until stress feels overwhelming.

Here are some simple grounding techniques you can try:

- **5-4-3-2-1 exercise:** Notice 5 things you can see, 4 things you can feel, 3 things you can hear, 2 things you can smell and 1 thing you can taste. This helps bring attention back to the present moment using the senses.
- **Categories:** Choose a category (e.g. animals, movies, sports teams or foods) and slowly name as many items as possible. This helps redirect attention away from anxious thoughts and back to focused thinking.
- **Counting backwards:** Slowly count backwards from 100 by 3s, 5s or 7s. This requires concentration and can help interrupt spiralling thoughts or panic.
- **Drawing or colouring:** Engaging in repetitive, creative activities, such as doodling, colouring or tracing patterns can help calm the nervous system and improve focus.

- **Box breathing:** Breathe in for 4 seconds, hold for 4 seconds, breathe out for 4 seconds and hold again for 4 seconds. Repeat several times to help calm the nervous system.

Need additional support?

Daramalan students have access to four counsellors and one school psychologist employed by the College. They are professionally qualified counsellors, social workers or psychologists who support the emotional, social and educational wellbeing of our students. 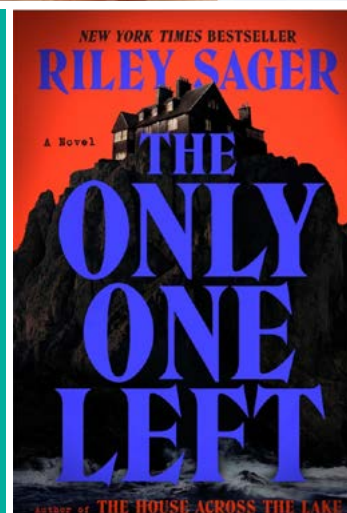
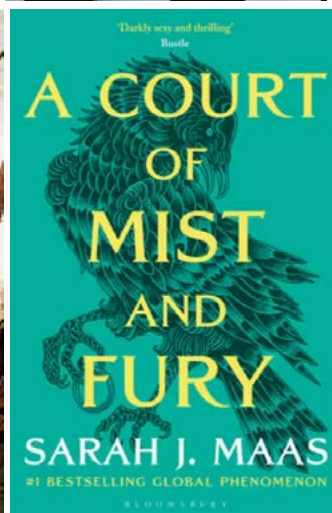
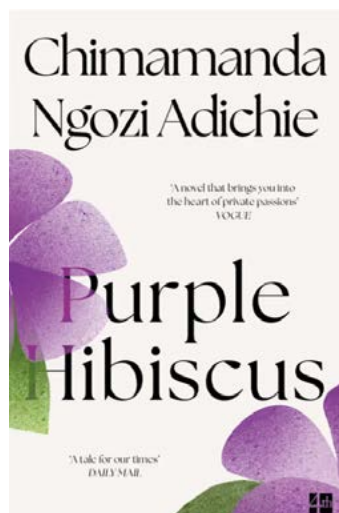

Thank you to everyone who came out to support, cheer and celebrate the incredible linguistic talent of our students. Until next year...keep spelling!

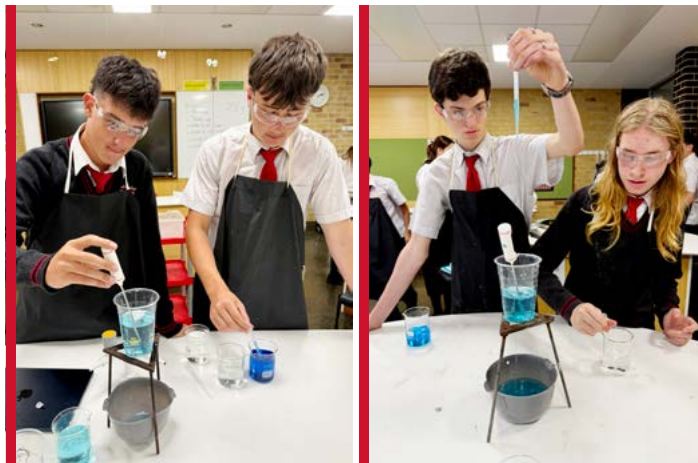

Science

Year 9 Nervous System and Homeostasis

Year 9 have been learning about the nervous system and homeostasis. To bring these concepts to life, students took part in an experiment that challenged them to keep a “body system” in balance. In this activity, students worked as a group to maintain water levels, temperature and colour of water within a specific range. Just like the human body, carefully regulating conditions and responding to changes, it quickly became clear that even small shifts could throw the system out of balance!



Year 11 Psychology

Our Year 11 Psychology students recently visited the National Zoo and Aquarium, where they explored how learning theories are applied in real-world settings. Bringing their studies of classical and operant conditioning to life, students discovered how animal trainers use these techniques to shape behaviour in a safe and ethical way.

Highlights included learning how positive reinforcement is used to train animals for important health procedures, such as encouraging sun bears to participate in dental checks, as well as training snakes to not bite their keepers!

Students also enjoyed some hands-on experiences, including holding a snake and feeding alpacas and emus, making it a memorable and engaging day of learning beyond the classroom.

Year 12 Chemistry

Pickle juice, orange juice, aspirin and white wine – what do all these things have in common? They are all on the materials list for Year 12 Chemistry while our students investigate real world scenarios that involve acid-base or redox titrations. Using volumetric analysis techniques they will need to determine the concentration of a solution and communicate their findings as an investigation report.



Titration Competition

The annual Titration Competition was held at the Australian National University on Saturday 9 May. This competition involves Chemistry students from various colleges across ACT competing against each other to accurately conduct titrations and calculate concentrations of unknown solutions. On Wednesday 13 May two senior Daramalan teams represented the College at the annual Ethics Olympiad. They competed via Zoom against many teams from ACT and NSW colleges with outstanding integrity, collegiality and respect throughout the competition.

Although we did not finish on the podium, the students' conduct, teamwork and thoughtful engagement in complex ethical discussions was truly commendable. We are incredibly proud of the way they approached each round with maturity and intellectual curiosity. 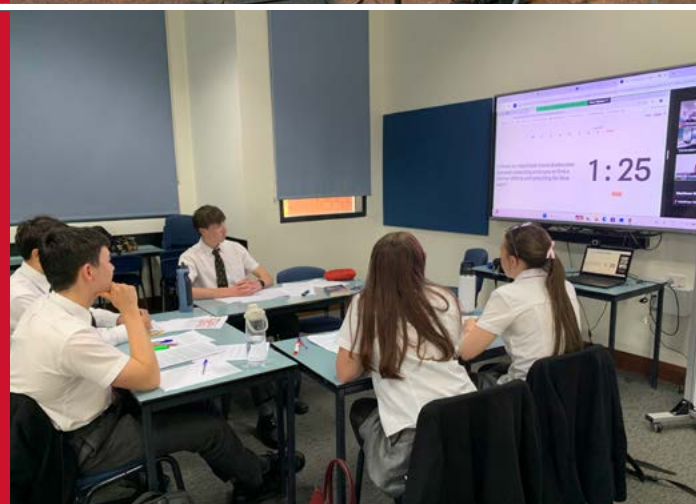

Multicultural Week and Languages Day

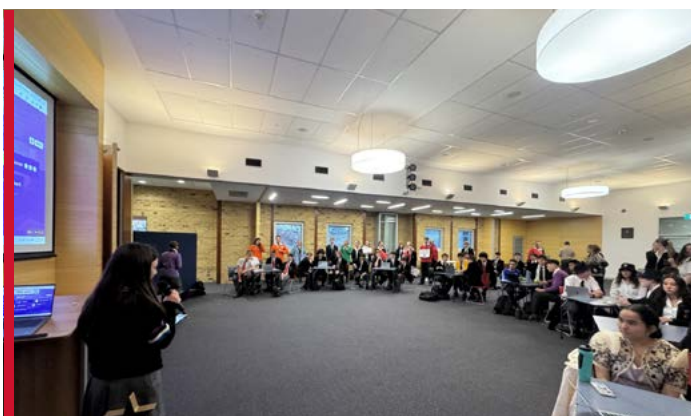

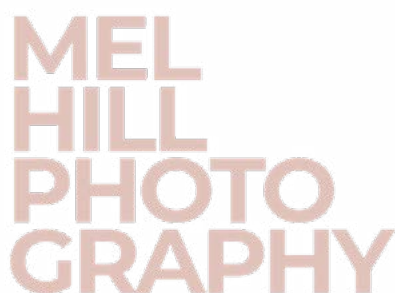
